


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
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Returning to regular practice

Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir - Midlands East- Malcolm Hill



Like all choirs, the Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir, has been severely affected by the Covid Pandemic. For a long time, it was restricted to practice by internet zoom sessions and all its arranged concerts had to be cancelled.

Returning to regular practice in the summer of 2021, it was decided that the choir would take its time before singing again in concert and to rebuild its confidence.

On 19 March 2022, the choir performed in concert as part of an Arts Festival in the grounds of Erewash Museum, Ilkeston, which it greatly enjoyed. This was followed by a full concert on 26 March at the choir's base at the Dale Club, Jacksdale,

which was very well attended. Then came a highly successful twice re-arranged tour to Devon with concerts held at Brixham and Paignton Parish Churches, raising £725.00 for this year's Poppy Appeal.

The highlight of the year was singing as part of a mass choir at York Minster on 14 May for the wedding of its President, Jason Darnell. This was an experience never to be forgotten and it gave all choir members a significant lift to receive many generous comments, including from choristers who sing in the Minster Choir.

The choir sang at a further wedding on 28 May for a choir member's daughter, Lindsay Braithwait, at St. Martin's Church, Alfreton.

All of the choir's concerts this year are dedicated to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in celebration of her Platinum Jubilee. It was fitting that the choir's last concert on 4 June was held at Maple Mews Sheltered Housing Complex, Alfreton, to celebrate this occasion and the choir was very happy to share in a celebration tea that followed.

So to the future after seven engagements in quick succession. Immediately, two choir parties for life celebrations where the opportunity to sing will no doubt not be missed, then to an eagerly awaited joint concert with Carlton and Sandiacre Male Voice choirs on 30 July at St. Paul's Church, Daybrook, in aid of the East Midlands Air Ambulance, with concerts continuing to build for the autumn and winter and 2023.

It was a day never to be forgotten in the history of the Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir who continue to have new experiences, even though they were formed as long ago as 1903.

The massed choir sang *God is gone up* by Gerald Finzi at the beginning of the service and *Let all the world in every corner sing* (Antiphon) by Ralph Vaughan Williams at the end of the ceremony. The

service also included the rousing hymns All Creatures Of Our God And King and Love Divine, All Loves Excelling and We Pledge To One Another to the tune of Thaxted. The Ebor Singers also sang a setting of O Love That Will Not Let Me Go, composed by Jason.

It difficult to describe the wonderful sound of so many accomplished singers both in the choir and audience joined together in harmony, aided by the outstanding acoustics of York Minster. A once in a lifetime experience never to be forgotten!

The service was conducted by the Revd Canon Michael Smith, Acting Dean.

Benjamin Morris expertly played the newly restored Minster organ.

As everyone left the Minster, they were greeted by the sound of the Minster bells and the day continued at a reception held at the Poppleton Centre, York, where all family, friends and choirs and partners were invited.

I thought some may be interested to hear of a magnificent achievement of one of our members.

Some long serving members of the choral organisation will recognise the name, Mrs Irene Hill, married to the late Mr Eric Hill. Those that do not will probably recognise her from the photographs.

In April 2022, Irene was presented with a certificate of service, a wonderful bouquet of flowers and a gold pendant of a treble clef on a gold chain.

This was all to honour her for the 70 years she has been official accompanist to our choir.

Irene joined the choir in 1952 as a young schoolgirl taking piano lessons with the late great Miss Noble in Thurnscoe and organ lessons in the chapel with Miss Smith, then the accompanist to the choir, her father being the conductor. Shortly after, Mary Smith took over from her father as conductor and Irene became a member and official accompanist to the choir. Thurnscoe Harmonic have always rehearsed twice weekly and although, over the years, there have been several assistant accompanists, she has always done the bulk of the accompaniment.

Her beloved husband Eric passed away in January 2004 and was himself a long serving member and official of the choir serving as both secretary and treasurer.

In the photos Irene is being presented with the certificate by our president, Mr Michael McGrey, with 56 years' service, flowers presented by our new chairman, Mr Ian Dowlman, with 16 years' service

and the gold pendant and chain, again by our president.

The MUIS Project 2021-2022

Snowdown Male Voice Choir - Thames South - Peter Whibley

The Starting Point

This project was a development of our 'Grow & Prosper' initiative triggered in 2017. The choir knew that the tradition of making music in the home and in the community was rapidly dying so needed to take action. So, in late 2020, a group of members was set up to devise a project aimed at men who had no experience of singing and as a result had little confidence about singing in public.

The Grand Plan

The group of eight choir members talked with many other choirs who had exactly the same concerns and some of whom had already taken action. The group realised that the best initiative that they heard about could be very well adapted to Snowdown's circumstances. Apart from the reality of the problem faced by Snowdown they knew that -

- The impact that making music has on physical and mental health is not well known.
- There is a high incidence of mental health difficulties in East Kent.
- Snowdown has a long and successful history of raising money for charity.

The best solution stared the group in the face - challenge inexperienced singers to raise money for charity in return for 8 free singing lessons and the opportunity to impress their families and friends by taking part as the 'MUIS' Choir in a Gala Concert.' Maybe, afterwards, they would like to join a real choir!

The charity chosen - because it's probably the one that's best known to men - was Prostate Cancer UK. This charity fights the battle against a condition known to most families and indeed to the members of Snowdown MVC.

The Objectives

For public consumption the two main objectives of the project were

said to be

- Raising a shedload of money for Prostate Cancer UK.
- Making the project a very enjoyable one-off experience for the volunteers.

Moving On

From January 2021 the organisers met monthly - by the dreaded Zoom! Right from the off the group was strongly supported by all our Front Team members who provided really constructive ideas about bringing together men with unknown ability to form a choir after only 8 rehearsals.

The group quickly adopted a team structure with each member carrying a specific responsibility. It wasn't fully appreciated at first that at different stages of the project different skills would be needed; fortunately, by sheer chance, this motley group of choristers just happened to have the right individuals with the right skill-sets at the right times.

Strokes of Luck

Two bits of luck came along at a very early stage. Firstly, Dover District Council has a strong commitment to supporting local communities and a member of the council staff provided a wealth of advice about raising money. Secondly, it transpired that all our local councils have concerns about the incidence of mental health difficulties in the area so showed great interest in helping to fund our project. One commercial organisation also expressed strong support. Within months sufficient grants were made to cover the substantial running costs. This gave the budget a sound footing as well as giving the organisers the confidence to plough on and activate the full plan.

The Outcomes

The project came to a head with a sold-out Gala Concert on 16 July 2022 which proved to be a very special event, possibly unique in the history of our choir. Clearly, the full impact upon the future of Snowdown will not become known for some time although the figures that are to hand at the time of writing this article speak for themselves -



20 years of singing

Hartlepool Ladies Choir - North East - Sue Stead



In 2002, whilst on an exchange trip to Germany with their husbands, a few wives of Hartlepool Male Voice Choir (HMVC) members decided to get together to sing, initially under the direction of John Holmes but soon after taken on by David Gibson (MD for HMVC). From these very humble beginnings, Hartlepool Ladies Choir (HLC) was formed and has not only grown in number, but in confidence and ability and continues to go from strength to strength.

Singing in four part harmony, the choir has built up an extensive repertoire of songs,

including songs from the shows, popular chart songs, classical, gospel, sacred, jazz, folk songs and more. A typical concert will provide a wide variety of songs to suit any audience.

Over the years, Hartlepool Ladies Choir have been fortunate enough to have taken part in many prestigious concerts: The Festival of Brass and Voice for Cancer Research UK at the Royal Albert Hall; NEAC Group 7 Choral Spectaculars at The Sage Gateshead; charity concerts with The Band of The Brigade of Ghurkhas and The British Army Band Catterick and sev-

eral Joint concerts with HMVC (including a trip to Germany to sing together). Alongside these have been the community fundraising concerts for charities and good causes and, of course, the choir's own annual concerts.

The Covid pandemic and subsequent lock-down challenged every choir in the country, but HLC decided it was not going to be their demise. Not to be defeated, their usual Thursday rehearsals were replaced with online Zoom rehearsals, music theory lessons, social events with online quizzes and even a Christmas party, with carols, songs, silly hats, wine and nibbles - all on Zoom! The committee and MD worked tirelessly to make sure members stayed in touch with each other through their social media page, emails and messages - hence the survival of the choir.

Despite a few members deciding not to return, HLC continues to grow. New members are being added regularly, the concert diary is open and social events are being planned — including a birthday party! In celebration of their birthday, their annual concert on 7 October will be made up of their 'top 15' pieces, as voted for by choir members and entitled 'Our Favourite Sings'.

150 years Unbroken Service

As Ashington & District MVC was founded 106 years ago we have no founder members but at the recent Annual Concert members recognized the services of three gents who between them have nearly 150 years of unbroken service.

Current President, George Wade joined in October 1973 to be followed by his brother Bill five years later which was at the same time as Eric Prytherch. Eric is still a strong member of the bass line whilst George enjoys 'social singing' at rehearsals. Unfortunately, Bill has had a few problems but is still hoping to sing again. It's this dedication that has inspired others to work hard and bring the choir back to the performance levels which were being achieved before our enforced two-year lock down.

Ashington Male Voice Choir was the orig-

inal name and, as Ashington was also known as the largest pit village, it's not surprising that there has been a considerable mining influence throughout its history. It was in the mid 50s when two other local choirs disbanded that the Ashington Choir absorbed the memberships and the title of Ashington & District MVC with a very large membership, something that it will be difficult to achieve again in the future, but we can always hope. The choir rehearses in the Stakeford and Bomarsund Welfare Centre which itself was one of the many welfare centres developed for the community in the Northumberland Mine Field and which were supported by both the industry and the miners themselves. Like most community organisations, ADMVC lost some of its stalwarts for various reasons during the pandemic but on resumption for every loss, a new member came along and with 31 we're now just above the 2020 total. It's also fortunate that some of recruits come with considerable choral experience

ADMVC had built a varied schedule of concerts for each year with many being for community and charitable organisations who were able to raise funds to help them. Unfortunately, and with like situations throughout the country, some of these failed to survive the pandemic. Work is now being done to re-develop the concert schedule and a couple of new events have been organised which will give help to identified charities. The choir has successfully performed two of its own promotions since coming together again.

A Christmas Concert in December saw a sell-out of tickets for its Saturday afternoon performance which naturally involved the audience in many Christmas favourites. There was then another month's lock down causing some delay to preparation for the early summer concert. No long-term ill effects and it was decided to link our Summer Concert to the Platinum Jubilee celebrations. A popular decision with another excellent audience and with support from the Sir James Knott Trust, a memorable celebration with the church being decked in Union Jacks and the audience joining in the patriotic songs creating a local 'Last Night of the Proms'. The presentations to the gents mentioned above added something very special to the occasion.

ADMVC now looks forward to building its strength both in membership and programme and hopes that the name will still be flying around many more generations.

Appledore Singers Are Back!

After 18 months of enforced inactivity, we assembled for rehearsals last September, raring to go. It was as if we'd never been away. concert raised £2000 for the charity.





New Album Launch

The choir has launched its long-awaited new album, their first since their Christmas CD in 2016. Aptly entitled 'We Rise Again', after the long enforced Covid break, it comprises 11 of the choir's most recent and popular songs, including their 11-minute *Back to the '60s' medley*.

Most of the tracks were laid down shortly before the pandemic but only in the past few weeks has it been possible to apply the finishing touches, enabling the album to be available for the 4th and 5th of the choir's Summer Quay Concerts in Mevagissey Harbour.

The CD marks the end of an era for the choir, whose Musical Director, Graham Willcocks, stepped down in the spring after 26 years. A new MD is currently being sought for the choir, which has emerged from the pandemic with more

than 40 singing members, a full concert programme going forward and a 50th anniversary to look forward to in 2024.

The Future Depends...

Tim Knight - composer, conductor, mentor, singing holiday leader, author and sheet music publisher

The future depends on what you do today, so said Mahatma Gandhi, and there is so much wisdom in that little quote that its worth considering in many walks of life.

Over the last couple of years there can hardly have been anyone left untouched by the pandemic, by the stop start of lockdowns and the lack of the normal rhythm and beat of everyday life, not only in people's work patterns and home life but also in the choral world, but working on the basis that every red light eventually turns green, I have looked at the return from the pandemic as being a source of opportunity, a time to reflect on what choirs should return to and what should now be reconsidered in the light of our changed and still uncertain times.

Some choirs will have returned smaller in size, recruitment has now become ever more important, some audiences have not returned, some venues (both rehearsal and performance) have closed their doors and amidst all this, the cost of living has risen so much that attending concerts or even paying subscriptions to societies and groups have come under scrutiny and have been cancelled.

This is reflected in the microcosmos community that is the amateur choral world and some choirs have seen bank balances dwindle and others have unfortunately had to close their doors completely, and of course behind every choir there are music publishers, professional musicians, venues, typesetters, composers, arrangers, in fact a whole army of people connected with the music trade that make the wheels turn.

Have we entered the vortex of doom, or are we now in the land of milk and honey....

Well, if you know me, you will know that I don't visit the vortex of doom if at all possible, I can see fresh green roots everywhere, I see for example that the NAC has managed to put on its conferences and keep communicating with its members, I see the irrepressible Mat Wright and his young peoples' choirs in Barnsley going from strength to strength, I have seen my own choirs return and restart their touring schedules and I see



fresh new choral composers producing new and exciting music which reinforces my belief that the choral world is reinventing itself, forward planning, thinking about and shaping the future.

There is a wheel of success, buy new repertoire that keeps your concerts fresh which encourages more people to come, which results in more ticket sales, which mean you can buy new repertoire to repeat the process and keep turning the wheel!

But back to the original quote, the future depends on what you do today, and here choirs are faced with a choice, it's a spectrum from doing nothing (and therefore nothing will change) or really looking to the future, remembering that committees of choirs are only Trustees for the time they are in office and that they must shape the choir on their watch to be ready for the future — to hand over their choirs in better shape and more relevant to the times we live in — to the new generation of committee members.

Buy a man a wonderful pair of new slippers and he will continue to use the worn out ones with holes in the toes, - because they are comfortable, he has lived with them a long time, they 'suit him' – in choral terms, maybe some hard hitting questions need asking, why do we sing what we sing? because we like it is often the reply, but that needs turning on its head, freshening up our repertoire so that it reflects the times we live in, making it relevant to the listener

- this helps to seek out new audiences, where do we sing? in a cold church where no one particularly wants to be, - again maybe we should be more proactive in going to the people rather than just expecting them to come to us.

Partnerships with other Arts organisations that involve young people, or even involve cross Arts events (for example Music and Dance) attract funding and indeed audiences! - New audiences - and some of those exposed to choral music will become singers maybe in your choir, or maybe in someone else's choir, every choir needs new members and should be on the lookout for them all the time, and partnerships mean getting involved with other NAC choirs in your area and beyond, sharing ideas, building bridges, holding concert performances, (and in the afterglow down the pub talking about your choir's future) and in turn strengthening the NAC so it has the power to represent you in the choral world at large.

Look to this day for it is life says the old text, yes this is life as it is today, but if the pandemic has shown us anything, it has shown us that life can change in a second, and we need to be planning, forward thinking, creating a vision which we can turn into reality, don't let others tell you what you can't do!

Set about looking at what you would like to do, in my opinion Musical Directors must have a vision for the next 5 years of their choir, what music, where shall we sing, what competitions shall we enter, shall we record, the answers to these questions are exciting, and excitement and enthusiasm are infectious and lead to change – nobody likes change but rather we make the changes we want or we have the changes we don't want forced upon us.

My door is always open to choirs that would like an earnest discussion about their future, over the years with my books I have travelled to many choirs and some have gone on to revitalise themselves and undertake amazing projects, some have heard but not listened, 'we have tried it all before and nothing works' they say, but as the more enlightened know, every failure is just one step on the road to success!

96th Annual General Meeting 34thAnnual Conference Weekend 24-26 March 2023

Having just compiled the proposed timeline and booking forms for conference 2023 at the Holiday Inn Taunton it occurs to me how quickly time passes by. It doesn't seem long ago that we were in Kendal.

Three Choir Appeal £1,160 for Air Ambulance

Carlton, Sandiacre and Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choirs - Midlands East - Malcolm Hill

Carlton, Sandiacre and Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choirs joined forces to raise money for the vital services provided by the Derbyshire, Leicester, Rutland, Warwickshire and Northamptonshire Air Ambulance in a concert held on Saturday 30 July 2022, at St. Paul's Church, Daybrook, Nottingham. The money raised will also be used to support the Children's Air Ambulance nationally.

All three well-known and long-standing choirs performed several of their diverse range of songs, representing all genres of music, from traditional male voice choir favourites to songs from the shows, gospel, pop and contemporary music – something for everyone! The choirs were led by their respective Musical Directors, Ian Watts, Stuart Graham and Linda Darnell. The concert ended in the choirs joining



forces to both sensitively and powerfully perform classic male voice 'anthems', culminating in *American Trilogy*, accompanied by the impressive Ian Watts on the church organ, lifting the roof! All performances were enhanced by the wonderful acoustics of St Paul's Church who also gave its facilities free to support the charity.

Entry to the concert was free to the public with voluntary donations collected by representatives of the Air Ambulance. The concert was deliberately organised not to restrict anyone from attending, irrespective of their means and recognising the financial pressure many people are experiencing at present, leaving it to individuals to give what they could afford, without any obligation. The fact that £1,160 was raised for the Air Ambulance without ticket sales is testament to the following of the combined choirs and the generosity of the public who filled the church to capacity.

Several ovations were received during the concert for all three choirs' individual performances and a standing ovation from the audience was received at the end of concert.

All three choirs are constantly looking to recruit new members and you will receive a warm welcome if you wish to join any of the male voice choirs who took part in the concert. Further details are available on





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


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50 busy years

Cor Meibion Colwyn – Wales N/Cheshire W – Charles Cooksley

The choir celebrates its 50th Anniversary in 2022 since its foundation in November 1972. Except for the pandemic period, Cor Meibion Colwyn has sung in a wide range of concerts every year, including tours to Cumbria, Ireland, Scotland, Belgium, Germany, Spain, Malta and Canada. In 2020 we gave a couple of performances in January and February 2020, then from March 2020 sang for 18 months of zoom rehearsals, led by our Musical Director Owain Gethin Davies. We were only permitted to sing at large public performances in both November and December 2021.

Recruitment continues to be a regular concern in UK and abroad for many years and we don't claim to know the answers. In contrast there are also some entirely new choirs, some fairly new male and SATB choirs linked with rugby clubs and some SATB choirs now expanding to about 100 voices. For what it's worth, below are



some of our own recent experiences. Generally, a lot can be gained if choirs in all categories and locations exchange ideas, experiences and contacts.

We have welcomed 10 new choristers in 2022 to date and there are now 60 choristers. Cor Meibion Colwyn has been exceptionally fortunate in 2020 in securing the services and commitment of our musical director, who has introduced new music and his own

arrangements. Some other factors that have influenced our development may be that there are many people wanting to come out for a new activity post pandemic and some people have moved into the area in the last 2 years. The choir has gained interest and recruits from performing in charity and Christmas concerts. Locally the choir has been known to remain active. Our impression is that the choir likes to keep busy with

new events at least once a month. Before the pandemic, we also recruited choristers from those who attended some large public events at which we sing.

2022 is a catch-up year for many choirs, charities, organisations and individuals and we are no exception.

This resulted in more than usual numbers of concerts, weddings, charities wanting fundraising events and tours delayed by the pandemic. Llandudno is one of the UK major resorts. We are singing in some much-delayed weddings that were booked as long ago as 2019 and January 2020.

In April we sang in Fair for Ukraine as a part of a programme of events and many other performers at Bodelwyddan. The fair raised around £3500 for vital urgent work of the DEC Disasters Emergency Committee. In May 2022 Llandudno we were part of a special concert to recognise the immense work, dedication and care by NHS workers, carers and Emergency Services and to commemorate all those affected by the pandemic. Principal soloists were award winning Erin Gwyn Rossington soprano (International singer of the future at Llangollen 2019) and Tomos Bohana tenor. Other concerts included on 4 June, a Platinum Jubilee concert and on 18 June at Wirksworth, Derbyshire in aid of the Air Ambulance and Derby Hospital. On 20 June we very pleased to host the River City chorale from Sacramento, California. Their repertoire included some of the UK and USA classical repertoire and folk and popular song from USA and UK.



On 25 June we sang in Venue Cymru Llandudno to around 1100 conference members of the Trefoil Guild (all former Girl Guides). A Cerdd dant (sometimes called Penillion) duo provided the uniquely Welsh singing genre. Cor Meibion Colwyn sang 12 songs, while two of our own tenors John Roberts and Alf Gladman sang solo items. Tom Jones our 2nd tenor was the link with the conference concert which was entitled A Taste of Wales. Perhaps because of his name, a special request was *Delilah* (non PC? but in great demand) for all the conference who sang along lustily (twice) and waved scarves.

Probably the greatest highlight of our year was the superb Philadelphia Girls Choir, whom we were delighted to host and sing with on 19 July in Llandudno. The girls are 12-18 years of age and are auditioned for four separate sections. They travel internationally and their repertoire is the most international and multilingual that we have heard. The repertoire and languages ranged from Hungarian Lajos Bardo), Zulu Amavolovolo Malay Ikan kekek, Cunnla), Torres Straits Islands (Aborigine), English (USA composers) and in English translation Welsh songs Suo Gan and Dechrau Eto plus Hen wlad fy nhadau in Welsh with us and audience. The Zulu song was danced and sung. The video of this song has attracted the interest of an NAC ladies choir. A very graceful dance in the Malay song was especially memorable too. They were in Llandudno for the two hottest days of the year. Earlier they had sung in a church in Cardiff and with the Mountain Ash Rugby Choir. After Llandudno they travelled to Edinburgh and Glasgow where they sang with the Glasgow Youth Choir.

We are now continuing with a series of further concerts in Llandudno, Betws y Coed, Colwyn Bay and elsewhere.

A New Choir is Born

Vauxhall Luton Male Voice Choir - North Thames - Dave Sage



This is a *Tale of Two Choirs* and, to an extent, the after effects of the Coronavirus pandemic which had serious repercussions on the choir fraternity. The Vauxhall Male Voice Choir and the Luton Male Voice Choir are both Luton-based and have successfully operated in the same locale over many years.

They are now proud to announce they have amalgamated into a single entity—the Vauxhall Luton Male Voice Choir. The formal date of the merger was 15 June 2022. The photo shows the choristers on this historic evening as they met for the inaugural weekly practice session of the new choir.

Born in 1943 as a respite from war work, the Vauxhall Motors Male Voice Choir, in only a few years, had gained quite a reputation locally and broadcast to our forces on radio. Of the seven choirs flourishing in Luton during that period, it is the only survivor to this day. With the welcome support of Vauxhall Motors it grew to a choir of over seventy choristers during the 1970s entering and winning several competitions.

During the 1980s it sang with famous massed military bands in the regular pageants held at the Luton Football Ground. During the 1970s the choir membership was opened to singers other than Vauxhall employees provided they belonged to the Vauxhall Recreational Club and in 2007

the choir became a stand-alone entity. For the last 20 years the choir has sung mainly for enjoyment and charitable causes.

The Luton Male Voice Choir was formed in 1993 by a small group of enthusiasts led by Musical Director, Mr Ken Hone, with the objective of promoting male voice singing for personal and public pleasure and benefit. Since that time thanks to the dedication of members and Ken, it has gone from strength to strength, having grown into an entertaining and an accomplished choir. Throughout the years the choir has raised many thousands of pounds for local charities and promoted the good name of Luton throughout the country by supporting charitable events as far afield as Norfolk, Yorkshire and Eastbourne.

What brought about the idea of amalgamation? Firstly, as the choirs emerged from the two years plus of Covid restrictions, both found themselves well down on chorister numbers. The reduction in size was not uniform across sections resulting in imbalance in the choir choral presentation. Some songs, previously favourites of the choirs, did not sound as good and, sometimes, could not be offered at all. Search for new members proved fairly fruitless – the few available singers were being shared with other types of choir.

The second reason was finance - reductions in membership numbers, and hence subscriptions, causes significant monetary problems to the running of a choir. Couple this with difficulties in re-starting the previous level of concert bookings after the long-enforced break led both choirs to dwindling ready funds.

The concept of merging two choirs suffering these symptoms is an ideal solution and the new choir was formed with enthusiasm. There was no room for the suggestion of 'us and them' in the new choir — it is all the 'new us' resulting in a fortystrong contented body of men fulfilled in singing together. Those various and peculiar traditions that build up and make a choir over the years are there to be shared with your new comrades and the best retained for posterity.

2023 is particularly significant as the year represents the eightieth anniversary of the Vauxhall choir and the thirtieth anniversary of the Luton choir. We all agree this be a year in which to hold a celebration of these notable occasions of our respective choirs' achievements. An exciting problem to solve - planning has now started!



A fond farewell to Sam Nickels

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
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
Where did I put my Valium?

And, if that wasn't enough, we always knew when summer was with us when Donald arrived at rehearsals with batches of his wild raspberry jam, which he generously sold to raise funds for the choir. He will be very greatly missed, and the choir's sincerest condolences go out to his lovely wife, Frances, and their three children and grand-children.



- Tell me who has written it.
- Write your article.
- Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).

- Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should
 NOT have a capital letter.
