From The President



Unfortunately Jan and I have not been able to fulfil our invitation to the MVC Tamworth Annual concert. We were on our way to Stetton near Burton on Trent when he were involved in an accident and I have

missed several concerts with Gresley MVC since then.

It will be several weeks before Jan is again mobile and our Christmas festivities had to be postponed and it may be some time before I get to the NAC meetings.

Gresley MVC are planning our next visit, this time to Cornwall and we will be joining with Marazion MVC in a concert.

Our trip to France was a great success and our supporters have started booking for the Cornwall trip.

60 years Conducting

Evacuated from Manchester to Mow Cop Stoke on Trent on 1 September 1939 aged 10 years, I started to sing in the Methodist Church Children's Choir. The evacuation period ended at the school leaving age of 14 and I returned to Manchester.

July was the Sunday School Anniversary time at Mow Cop and I asked my parents if I could go for the weekend to listen to the choir, to which they agreed. My old friends asked the conductor if I could sing with them. He said yes, if I could learn the 6 songs off by heart in time. My mates and I spent all Saturday afternoon and evening practicing and I sang with the choir on the Sunday.

One of the songs had a chorus that included the old hymn tune Beulah Land and this tune played so much on my mind when I went home, that I asked my parents, this time, if I could go back to Mow Cop to stay, which I did, and stayed until September 1991. It was during the 'Open Air' singing at the Sunday School Anniversary in July 1950 that the conductor asked me to take over while he had a cigarette, I asked what I should do, he just gave me his pitch pipe, told me to choose a hymn, give the note and conduct. In February 1952 the conductor retired due to ill health and I was appointed his successor, as it turned out, two days after the Queen's official proclamation of her accession to the throne.

Through illness and deaths I eventually became the choirmaster at three Methodist Churches and the guest conductor for Oratorio performances at another. From 1957 to 1979 (when I had a heart attack), again due to the same reasons, I conducted three performances of 'Messiah' and two of 'Elijah' and 'Creation' each year. For a two year period I was also the deputy conductor of The City of Stoke on Trent Choral Society. During 1976/77/78/79 I formed a United Church Choir, a choir of some 220 voices and conducted two performances of 'Messiah' and two of 'Elijah' for various charities in Hanley's Victoria Hall, where we also had a notable recorded NAC concert involving 16 Group Eleven choirs.

Moving to Sale in 1991 and in 1992 I formed the Meadway Singers (Ladies Choir) and in 1994 Meadway Youth Choir

and Meadway Junior Singers. I became the secretary of Group One for Nine years and Chairman for a further Three years. During that time we had Group One Events at Wigan Pier, Royal Northern College of Music and Bolton's Victoria Hall, the latter two involving 400 singers. I formed the Francis House Children's Hospice Choir (75 voices) and with them performed 'Messiah' (twice), 'Creation' and Faure's 'Requiem'. In 2000 I was invited to be the guest conductor for a performance of Mozart's 'Requiem' in Manchester.

In July 2011 accompanied by my wife, Irene, I attended the Queen's Garden Party at Buckingham Palace by invitation, described as being for my 'Outstanding service to music in South Manchester'. I was obviously nominated, but I have never found out by whom. I will be 83 on 28 March, but still enjoy conducting my three choirs with four hours weekly rehearsals and hope to continue 'DV'. My musical career, looking back, began with an old hymn tune and a cigarette! I am now only an Associate Member of the NAC but choral singing is in my blood.

On their last visit to France, twentytwo years ago, the choir performed in Pithiviers.



Last year the choir was honoured to sing at the fiftieth year twinning celebration of Ashby de la Zouch and Pithiviers at the Manor House School, Ashby de la Zouch, Leicestershire. This paved the way for our return with immense help from Aimee Hanaquin, President of the twinning society.

Monday morning the 12 September was the day we had all been looking forward to as we all set off on our trip to France after many hours of planning.

The one thing that couldn't be planned was the weather with very blustery conditions forecast. With one of our two coaches booked for a ferry crossing, things were looking a little difficult; with force nine gales reported to our coach driver, it looked like being a long day. Then there was the other problem that seems to blight our motorway 'traffic' and boy there was some, all of which made for a very long journey to our hotel in Orleans. Our 'Ferry' coach arrived some five hours later than planned at 1.30 the next morning but hats off to the hotel for keeping the restaurant open to make sure that everyone had got something to eat and drink on arrival.

The following day gave us free time in Orleans to have a look at the cathedral, prior to our concert on the Friday night. There are few words that could describe the feeling when one looked up the street to this enormous building, where we were soon to sing. After looking inside I think we all felt quite emotional, to say the least.

Wednesday saw us take a trip to Chartres for an afternoon concert in one of the world's greatest cathedrals. Having to push all our equipment through cobbled streets too small for a coach to travel, we made straight for the cathedral. Words are inadequate to describe the opportunity we were about to embark on. 'Mind blowing' might go a little way towards it and it certainly didn't disappoint! The acoustics were unbelievable.

Thursday brought a day off from singing with two different trips planned; one to Paris and the other to Versailles, both of which went well with lots to see and do.

Friday we visited Chateau de Chambord, which was but a short trip from our Hotel down the Loire Valley; yet again a very impressive place well worth a visit if ever you find yourself in that area. After an early dinner it was time to make our way to our evening concert at Orleans cathedral, about ten minutes walk for those able, with the rest going on the coach. Here we sang in front of the high altar in the, usually locked, nave. The sound was incredible, disturbing all the bats high up in the roof!

Saturday came all too soon. This was our last full day where we relaxed and took an early dinner before heading for Pithiviers and our final concert. The church was full where we experienced amazing standing ovations and encores. We were made most welcome and after our performance presented a vase on a wooden plinth as a memento of our visit and also a gift to Aimee Hanaquin for making it possible to sing in such prestigious venues. Afterwards people were reminiscing over pictures and memories from our last visit and gave us a warm invitation to visit again.



It was felt by the organising committee that these concert venues presented their members with an opportunity of a lifetime and it certainly lived up to all expectations and more. The choir continues to perform its engagements and is preparing a new repertoire to be performed first in their Celebrity Concert at Burton upon Trent Town Hall, on Saturday 29 October 2011 with guest Adele O'Neill

A Simpleton's Guide to the Four Part Choir.

Here is the last in our series of four part choir guides.

The Basses

They sing the lowest of anybody. This basically explains everything. They are stolid, dependable people, and have more facial hair than anybody else. The basses feel perpetually unappreciated, but they have a deep conviction that they are actually the most important part (a view endorsed by musicologists, but certainly not by sopranos or tenors), despite the fact that they have the most boring part of anybody and often sing the same note (or in endless fifths) for an entire page.

They compensate for this by singing as loudly as they can get away with - most basses are tuba players at heart. Basses are the only section that can regularly complain about how low their part is, and they make horrible faces when trying to hit very low notes.

Basses are charitable people, but their charity does not extend so far as tenors, whom they consider effete poseurs. Basses hate tuning the tenors more than almost anything else. They like altos - except when they have duets and the altos get the good part. As for the sopranos, they are simply in an alternate universe which the basses don't understand at all. They can't imagine why anybody would ever want to sing that high and sound that bad when they make mistakes. When a bass makes a mistake, the other three parts will cover him, and he can continue on his merry way, knowing that sometime, somehow, he will end up at the root of the chord.

Then, on 4 June in The Guildhall in Hull, we presented a Centenary Concert with the Humberside Police Concert Band as our guests. This was followed by a very successful HMVC Centenary Dinner Dance at the Ramada Hotel in Willerby on 13 August before the choir got down to more serious work in preparation for its jewel in the crown concert, 'Sounds of Celebration', two months later.



On Saturday 22 October Hull City Hall was filled to capacity for Hull Male Voice Choir's major centenary charity concert 'Sounds of Celebration', and the audience was rapturous when, at the commencement of the evening, compere, Terry Wallis (of Hull Male Voice Choir, introduced the Brighouse and Rastrick Band - 2011 Champions of Great Britain - with their guest conductor, Mark Bentham, and the massive silver Championship Cup that they had won in the Royal Albert Hall on the previous Saturday evening was ceremoniously lifted onto its pedestal by two band members for all to view during the evening. We were honoured to have amongst our special guests at this concert the President. Chairman and Secretary of the National Association of Choirs as well as the Lord Lieutenant of the East Riding, the High Sheriff of Hull, the Chairman of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and many other civic dignitaries from the area, including the Lord Mayor of Kingston upon Hull.



A Massed Male Voice Choir - comprising some 120 voices from not only Hull Male Voice Choir but also Beverley Male Voice Choir and Driffield Male Voice Choir (all members of the National Association of Choirs) - was conducted by Julian Savory, and accompanied on the piano by Dorcas Leather and on the organ by Ian Cockerline. The audience was clearly highly delighted by the high performance of the massed choir but clearly the stars of the evening were the Brighouse and Rastrick Band who gave first class championship performances, with some outstanding playing by their soloists, and the band leading the finale in true 'Last Night at the Proms' style with much flag waving by the audience and vigorous singing! Clearly the audience appreciated our charity concert which was the climax of our centenary celebrations. It really was a 'wow' factor experience for Hull, enjoyed by everyone. One of our senior civic VIP guests commented that it is almost unknown to achieve a capacity audience in Hull's City Hall, so we are absolutely thrilled by the response of the public in supporting our event. Special thanks are due to the regional and local media for their support: to Majestic Publications for its highly professional service in delivering free of charge excellent posters and programmes; to the staff at Hull City Hall who did a commendable job and to everyone else who assisted in making the concert such a great success, especially our audience.

To close the year, we presented our popular 'Sounds of Christmas' concert to another capacity audience on Friday 2 December in The Guildhall Hall, when our special guest choir was the City of Hull Youth Choir which gave an impressive performance. Representatives from the two nominated charities to benefit from our 'Sounds of Celebration' concert in October - HELP the HEROES and our local Dove House Hospice - attended and were each presented with cheques for £8,615 by our new Choir President, Councillor David Gemmell OBE, as a result of the financial success of our concert, made possible by the support of our audience, from advertisers in our programmes and the generosity of sponsors, some of whom wish to remain anonymous and to whom we are very grateful.

Hull Male Voice Choir launches 2012 recruitment drive

St. Stythians Male Voice Choir Cornwall

The St. Stythians Male Voice Choir was founded in 1947 in Stithians, Cornwall, a village situated between Falmouth, Helston, Redruth and Truro.



Stithians, with a population of about 2100, lies in a granite upland area. The parish is mainly agricultural but traditionally quarrying and mining (tin, copper, etc) provided most of the employment in the district. The parish church is dedicated to St Stythian, hence the name adopted by our choir. The origins of our Saint, however, are something of a mystery. Our saint may have been female. We just do not know.

John Wesley visited Stithians in 1744-50 and brought Methodism to the parish. Penmennor Chapel built in 1865 (United Methodist Free Church) is set half a mile west of the village. Just across the road sits the abandoned Hendra Chapel (1815, Wesley Methodist), which is now converted into dwellings. It has often been said that more than half of the chapels in Cornwall are monuments to an argument. These two chapels form a good example being unusually close. Whatever the cause of the differences, Penmennor the building won out. This has been the 'home' of our choir for many years – and very grateful we are for being allowed this privilege.

The choir was founded by Sydney Bowden, who also later founded the Stithians Ladies Choir in 1966. Our current Musical Director, Ken Downing, joined the choir at age 14. He became Director in 1986. Sydney and Ken between them have directed the choir for 60 of its 64 years. Choir members are drawn from Stithians, surrounding villages and the Camborne/Redruth, Falmouth and Helston areas.

The choir is a founder member of the Cornish Federation of Male Voice Choirs and has participated in all four massed Cornish Choir Concerts at the Royal Albert Hall, London between 1980 and 2000. Highlights of the last decade include gaining third place in the Malta International Music Festival and three appearances in massed choir concerts at the Fairfield Halls, Croydon, the latest being in June 2006. Another is planned for 2012. The choir regularly competes in local and county music festivals and has participated in all five Cornwall International Male Choral Festivals 2003 - 2011 based in Truro.

The choir performs 20 or more concerts per year, singing across the County from St. Buryan to Bude. It tries to tour about once a year and has visited South Wales, SE England, the Midlands and Lancashire, Malta and France. Several appearances on TV have extended its range of activities. The latest of these was BBC's Songs of Praise from Truro Cathedral in 2008 with other Cornish choirs. Our repertoire contains lighter, more modern music and show songs together with the traditional 'grand' male voice items, spirituals and hymns. The choir has made a dozen or so recordings over the years. We do not put a 'sell by' date on these - our public usually does this for us! One series of five albums, however, has proved remarkably durable. 'Sing with Sankey' was made with the Stithians Ladies Choir in 1974. The combined choirs made

these Sankey recordings between 1974 and 1992, the last being 'Sankey – the Fifth Album', produced as a CD. All five recordings are now available as CDs. The series contains 73 hymns and we think that it may well be one of the most complete collections in the world. The recordings sell across the UK and in Australia (including Tasmania), New Zealand, South Africa and the United States.

Ira D Sankey was originally an amateur singer, composer and choirmaster. He composed several hymns and, with preacher Dwight Moody, formed a worship team in the United States. Sankey used hymns from many sources and composers, mainly those in the characteristic style you might say 'robust' - that has lived on.

As new members, we look forward to joining in the forum that NAC provides.

In 2011, the Wessex Male Choir celebrated its 10th anniversary. Originally the inspiration of its musical director, Rob Elliott, Wessex has come a long way in those 10 years, and in July 2011 the choir became International Male Choir Champions at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod.



Wessex began 2011 with ambitious and exciting goals. In February, it recorded a new CD, 'It's Christmas', to raise money for Parkinson's UK. Of course, we will remember 2011 as the year we lived the dream by winning at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod. This was our third attempt having previously been placed 3rd and 2nd. The choir sang 3 pieces: *Psalm 150* with music by Goff Richards; *Demon in My View*, a poem by

Edgar Allen Poe set to music by Jeffrey T Horvath in eight parts; and *Salvation is Created*, a hymn written by Pavel Chesnokov and sung in Russian. All of these Llangollen performances are on our website under 'Videos'.

Following the summer break, Wessex, like all choirs, got back to the business of rehearsing and learning new pieces.

In October it celebrated its 10th Anniversary with a Dinner-Dance at the Four Pillars in the Cotswold Water Park. Concerts at the Yeovil Octagon and then with Paul Potts in the Parkinson's UK Christmas Concert at Central Hall Westminster ended the year in style. Crawford's Cymru Cwiz Answers on page 32

Here are ten questions about Welsh songs, the 'bread and butter' of male voice choirs in Wales and beyond.

- 1. Which song is translated into English as 'Little Saucepan'?
- 2. Which song was composed by Joseph Parry and first published in 1875? Parry wrote the music to lyrics written by Richard Davies 1833–77. Some sources say it was written with Parry's childhood sweetheart in mind.
- 3. Translate *Diolch I'r Ior* into English.
- 4. What is the popular hymn tune written by John Hughes (1873–1932) and first performed in 1907? It is often erroneously called *Bread of Heaven*.
- 5. In 1993 the newly-appointed Secretary of State for Wales, John Redwood, was embarrassingly videotaped opening and closing his mouth during a communal singing of the national anthem, clearly ignorant of the words but unable to mime convincingly. What was he trying to sing?
- 6. 'Praise the Lord his glories show'. In English it means 'The Church of St Mary'. What is the popular hymn tune?
- 7. Which 'Welsh?' tune was originally the English hymn 'I hear thy welcome voice', the words and tune of which were written in 1872 by the American Methodist minister and hymn writer Lewis Hartsough (1828-1919), during a revival meeting at Epworth, Iowa where Hartsough was Pastor?
- 8. Which Welsh favourite is a song and military march which is traditionally said to describe events during a seven year long siege between 1461 and 1468?
- 9. What kind of song is Suo Gân and why is it a strange one for a male voice choir?
- 10. This is unusual among the most popular Welsh traditional hymns and songs in that the English version of the words is virtually never sung but the tune does appear, for example, in the current (British) Methodist hymn book, 'Hymns & Psalms' set to the lyrics of 'I will Sing the Wondrous Story' by P P Bliss. What is the tune?

It has been some time since we had a biography of one of our officers so here is one for you to enjoy. Or not, please yourselves. *Crawford*

Bob cannot remember a time when he did not sing; in church choir, in junior school choir, at Hull Grammar School, Hull Youth Choir, College G & S, Orpheus, Humberston Singers and church choir again. Even when not with an organised choir he sang with guitar in school. The song *How Can I Keep From Singing* says it really.

Bob trained as a teacher at the Sunderland College of Education, spending three very enjoyable years in the north east and leaving with a teaching certificate and a wife, Julie.

Bob is a Hull lad and Julie one of those pretty Nottingham lasses so they set up home in Grimsby of all places. They spent their honeymoon in a rather ancient caravan in Cleethorpes while they hunted for a flat. They found one on the Thursday and began work in Grimsby on the following Monday.

Bob was a Primary School teacher who always dreaded the question, asked by new people he met, 'What do you teach?' the answer was 'Children' but that always seemed not to be what they wanted to hear.

From the time, at Hull Grammar, that he was roped in by Fred Plater (Alan's brother) to play a small part in Julius Caesar, he has loved to 'tread the boards'. He played the voice of God in a college Mystery Play (The nickname 'God' following him

through college). He appeared in 'The Alchemist' where he ended the play with his trousers round his ankles. Bob played Leontes in Shakespeare's 'A Winter's Tale' and sang in three G&S operettas.

For several years, after college, he was a member of a local drama group. In school he began a very happy dramatic time directing school Christmas productions and writing, directing and acting in pantomimes which the teachers presented for the children. Here he established the dubious reputation for playing the dame which also went into panto for the Orpheus.

He is a Licentiate of Trinity College of Music London as a teacher of speech and drama.

Bob plays golf but has never claimed to play well. It didn't help when one February morning a golf ball, struck by his playing partner, rebounded from a hazard marker and struck him in the left eye. The surgeon was able to save the eye but he has no sight in it. The whole event did nothing to improve his handicap but he still plays the same course. He hopes for three things from his golf games; good exercise, good companionship and good golf but generally has to be satisfied with two out of the three.

When he retired from primary school teaching in 1999 he took up Creative Writing and has written many short stories, three of which appear in anthologies produced with Hull University. He had a story published in Bon Marché's Magazine, earning the princely sum of £100. There also exist, in a draw somewhere, two chapters of a book that are unlikely ever to see the light of day.

Bob sings first tenor and is Stage Manager for the Orpheus Male Voice Choir with whom he has sung for twenty-five years. It was around the time that he joined the Orpheus that the name 'Crawford' came into being. He still insists that he will only tell that story, at NAC conference, for the price of a pint. He also produces posters, programmes and tickets for all Orpheus activities so the opportunity to produce a complete national publication was too much to resist.

One of his prized possessions is a season ticket for Hull City. He was at Wembley on the day that two historic records were set for his beloved 'Tigers', their first appearance at Wembley and their entry into the Premiership after 104 years.

Bob has been married to Julie for over forty years. He has three children, John, Christopher and Kirsty and three grandchildren, Abigail, Sam and Megan, and we mustn't forget two dogs, Perdi and Poppy.

from the Earl of Burlington (later the Duke of Devonshire). After a disappointing start and the expenditure of £25,000 he purchased and leased other mines in the area, which he worked successfully. The House then became a hotel in 1892 where Lieutenant A D Macleod became proprietor. His tenure was marked by his colleagues by the presentation of a rifle which is now proudly displayed on the Lounge wall, adjacent to the Drawing room. Between 1910 and 1911 drastic alterations were made, when an entire storey was added between the existing first and second floors. The wing, which now includes the Moonwater Restaurant on the ground floor, was added and the then existing tower was removed stone by stone and reconstructed above the new storey. Since transferring from a private house to a commercial hotel the house has seen many owners and was even part of the hostile take-over by the TrustHouse Forte plc group before finally ending up in the ownership of the Corus Group.

Working closely with Stockhausen David also conducted this exceptional choir in the German première of Scene II from his opera Sontag aus Licht. David has worked with the London Philharmonic Choir, the Hallé Choir, and the CBSO Chorus for whom he is the Associate Conductor, as well as the national youth choirs of Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales.

David has adjudicated at international choral festivals as well as for the BBC Choir of the Year and Young Musician of the Year competitions. He conducts for BBC Television's 'Songs of Praise' and directed 'The People's Chorus' for BBC Four.

As Principal Conductor of Young Voices, David directs massed choirs in an annual series of concerts with some choirs incorporating more than 8,000 singers. He continues to work with Sinfonia Viva as their Choral Advisor, a project leader and conductor, and has also directed large scale education projects with the Orchestra of Welsh National Opera, the English Symphony Orchestra, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra. In 2011 David will conduct Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with the Barrier Reef Orchestra as part of a six week visit to Queensland and in 2012 will be the principal speaker, workshop leader and seminar presenter for the National Association of Choirs National Conference.

Liz Garnett studied music at the Universities



of Bristol (BA Hons, 1st class) and Southampton (PhD, 1995). She then taught at Colchester Institute's School of Music and Performance Arts for four years, before moving to Birmingham Conservatoire where

she was Head of Postgraduate Studies until 2009. Her teaching experience is varied in subject area, delivery style and level, from lectures in Musical Philosophies to practical

workshops on Playing by Ear and one-to-one tutorials in Professional Development for Musicians.

As a student, she studied piano with Christopher Northam (gaining an LRAM in piano teaching) and singing with Glynn Davenport, Duncan Robertson and Molly Petrie. She started conducting as an undergraduate, attending the Choral Conducting course at the Canford Summer School of Music at age 19, then went on to conduct the Southampton University Light Opera Society as a postgraduate.

She became involved in barbershop music after the completion of her PhD, and it became the subject of her first book. She is one of the UK's most prominent arrangers and performance coaches, having coached and/or arranged for many of the UK's top choruses and quartets, and arranged for groups from the UK, Ireland, the USA, Canada, Germany and Holland. She certified as a Music Category judge in 2000, and served as LABBS Music Category Director from 2006-2009. She has adjudicated in both barbershop and 'mainstream' choral classes at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod and the Sligo International Choral Festival, and is the founder-director of a female closeharmony choir called Magenta.

After the completion of the barbershop book, her research and practical interests focused back on conducting, leading to a five-year project that produced her second major book 'Choral Conducting and the Construction of Meaning'. The research process involved visits to more than 40 choirs in rehearsal, and these observations provided not only material for the book, but also a deep understanding of the conductorchoir dynamic in a wide variety of contexts and styles. This experience continues to nourish her work as a choral clinician, giving rich and varied insights into the problems that conductors and choirs face, and the relative success of different approaches to solving them.

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Côr Meibion Brymbo Wales North/Cheshire West

The choir tours the Borders .

A splendid four day tour of the Scottish Borders was greatly enjoyed by Côr Meibion Brymbo at the end of May 2011. The usual impressive singing by the choir, combined with our travels through the magnificent countryside of the Scottish Borders made a wonderful few days away, with choristers' wives and friends accompanying Brymbo Choir.



Most importantly, this tour was to be the last one undertaken by Glyn Hughes MBE before his retirement as the choir's Musical Director. Glyn has been 46 years as Musical Director and so has conducted many concerts worldwide; this Scottish tour, although perhaps not so far-flung as earlier venues, provided a most memorable celebration of Glyn's work with the choir.

After an early morning start the coach took us through Northumberland to the border town of Coldstream and to our accommodation booked in hotels and hostelries in nearby Wooler. It was back to Coldstream that evening for a delicious meal of traditional Scottish fare: haggis, neeps and tatties, so generously provided by our hosts. It was indeed a warm welcome and a most convivial first evening of our stay.

Next morning was free time to spend in Wooler and perhaps a climb into the Cheviot Hills behind the town, before returning to Coldstream for yet more warm hospitality and lunch and a final choir practice, before what was perhaps the high spot of the tour that evening.

Brymbo Male Choir had been invited to join with the Coldstream Pipe Band as part of their 80th anniversary celebrations, and what a fantastic evening it was!

After yet another lavish dinner and the bar facilities open, the concert began.

This comprised an extensive and varied programme of singing by the choir along with a spellbindingly polished performance by the Old Coldstream Corps of Drums and orchestral pieces by Harmonie Municipales d'Origny en Thierache. The rousing marches of the Coldstream Pipe Band led by Drum Major Rob Bell, added to this brilliant and awesome spectacle. Brymbo Choir was proud to receive a standing ovation after their final piece, the uplifting and exhilarating *Gwahoddiad*.

The musical section of the evening ended with a fantastic finale of everyone joining together in their singing, or playing, of *Highland Cathedral, Flower of Scotland, Amazing Grace* and *National Anthems*: the sheer volume of such a thrilling sound should stay for a long time in the memories of those who were there.

Next morning the venue was Coldstream Parish Church for the Sunday service. This important building, with its close association with the Coldstream Guards, and a part of the Church of Scotland, presented an impressive setting for an uplifting and thought-provoking service. It is a large, imposing church with a fine stone pulpit at the arched entrance to the chancel which is hung with the Kings and Regimental Colours. Again the choir excelled themselves and their singing of Cwm Rhondda, Morte Christe, Gwahoddiad and The 23rd Psalm brought the packed congregation to its feet in yet another standing ovation: an applause and appreciation not usually displayed in a religious service.

More generous Scottish hospitality followed before reluctantly leaving Coldstream, and travelling along the border to Dumfries; this was a spectacular journey through remote and unspoilt countryside, flanked by the Tweed, Yarrow and Moffat rivers.

Our arrival in Dumfries gave little time at our hotel to get ready for the evening, but with the typical good-humour and resilience of Brymbo Choir we piled once again on our coach and arrived at St George's Parish Church for the evening concert where Brymbo was to join with the Dumfries Male Voice Choir. Another wonderful performance was given by both choirs. Dumfries' choice of some modern, showtime pieces complemented the choral items chosen by Brymbo, and made for a most enjoyable and eclectic programme of music which was enthusiastically enjoyed by everyone.

This was a marvellous short Scottish tour which we all greatly enjoyed; there is a varied social life in joining a male voice choir and anyone interested will be given a warm welcome by Brymbo Male Choir.

Lord Jones spoke on the joys and value of singing and the very significant contribution of Cor Meibion Brymbo to the local community whilst under the directorship of Glyn Hughes over such a long period of time.

Rod Williams living in Llandegla in North Wales, not only sings in the choir but is also a full-time artist specialising in watercolour and pastel. Rod was commissioned to paint a portrait of Glyn on his retirement and a delightful, relaxed likeness of the retiring Musical Director, sitting in a chair, was unveiled and drew much admiration during the evening.

The choir is now under the directorship of Dr David N Evans and we wish him and the choir continuing success in the future.

The choir's Business Manager, John Blue, ever industrious, is never satisfied unless he has filled up every available Friday or Saturday evening with a concert, so watch this space. Members may groan at the burden being thrust upon them, but enjoy it nevertheless.

Services to Music in the 2012 New Years Honours List.

The choir is justifiably proud that Marilyn has been awarded this honour in the year the choir celebrates its Diamond Jubilee anniversary and Marilyn her 20th year as conductor. This, the 2011/12 season marks 110 years of musical excellence for the choir - 50 Years of its predecessor the Glasgow Orpheus Choir and now 60 years of the Glasgow Phoenix Choir.

Marilyn has upheld this tradition through her artistic direction and musical leadership, resulting in the Glasgow Phoenix Choir enjoying a global reputation as one of the foremost mixed voice choirs in the United Kingdom. Under her direction, the choir has flourished and has now performed throughout Scotland, the UK, Europe and the USA. Marilyn and the choir's reputation have been further enhanced by the generous sponsorship of The Co-operative Funeralcare which has allowed the choir to raise significant funds for a wide variety of charitable projects, whilst promoting the joy of singing, which is at the forefront of everything Marilyn and the choir have achieved together. Marilyn, through her teaching, has also been a major advocate for young people and has wherever possible created performance opportunities for them with the choir in major concert venues. Aged 59, Marilyn originally from London, has lived in Bearsden in Scotland for the past 39 years.

Marilyn Smith said, 'I am extremely honoured to receive this prestigious award and would like to thank the musicians and choristers I have worked with over so many years, those who have nominated me for this award and every member of the Glasgow Phoenix Choir, past and present.'

George Tinning, Managing Director, The Cooperative Funeralcare, which has supported the choir since 2007, said: 'Marilyn has been deservedly recognised for the way in which she has helped to spread choral music across Scotland. This honour is particularly fitting for the charitable activities of the choir and the work that she has done in encouraging young people to get involved in choral music.'

GPC Conductor and Musical Director Marilyn J. Smith was appointed Conductor and Musical Director in 1991. Trained at the Royal Academy of Music in London, she gained her LRAM and Professional Certificate in Singing before moving to Scotland in 1973. She sang professionally as a soloist, and with Scottish Opera, the Royal Scottish National Orchestra Chorus, the Scottish Chorus and the John Currie Singers.

Marilyn teaches singing at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, and Glasgow University, and is in great demand as a choral trainer. Choirs have always played a significant part of Marilyn's career. She first conducted a very successful junior choir in London, and in Scotland, trained and conducted children's and adult choirs before her appointment to the Glasgow Phoenix Choir. With the GPC she has made many recordings and toured Europe, the UK and USA. The choir gives regular concerts in the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, throughout Scotland and beyond.

Marilyn is in great demand as a vocal and choral coach and conducts master classes and workshops in her own inimitable way. She regularly adjudicates at music festivals including the National Mod. Marilyn is proud that many of her students are now performing, teaching and conducting professionally themselves, keeping the tradition of choral singing alive.
