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#### **Music & Festivals Officer**

We introduce David Goodwin, one of our new officers and he offers some thoughts on the cost of that stuff which we need to keep us singing - sheet music



David was born in London and after studying at the Compass Arts School spent his formative years living and working in London. He met his future wife Rosemary in 1994 after

deciding that he would rather like to meet the owner of the voice he has been ordering music from for the previous year!

He started at Banks Music Publications in 1995 as sheet music buyer, and in the following ten years became an authority on copyright, producing a pamphlet on the subject in 1998. He then left to follow a chosen career path in the theatre as an actor and singer enjoying ten years as a 'jobbing performer' which included three years (2009-2012) as dame in the pantomime at The Georgian Theatre Royal in Richmond. And acting as producer for the Jake Thackeray musical 'Sister Josephine Kicks the Habit'.

In 2014 he and Rosemary bought Banks Music Publications from the then owner Margaret Silver, and returned to the fold.

#### The Power Of The Pound

We all know that as a general rule, music is expensive. We also know that we cannot avoid the purchase of it to keep our choirs afloat. But there are options here...

It is always worth chatting to your music supplier to get the best price possible. MusicRoom and SheetMusicPlus are not always the be all and end all.

As the new music officer of the NAC as well as a publisher and third party supplier I am always on the lookout for the best deal. We have recently taken up the cudgels on your behalf with certain publishers who set too high a price for music. Boosey and Hawkes currently charge an inflated price per copy for short order titles, where instead of putting a title out of print and very difficult to get hold of, they charge £6.50 each per copy, mainly due to the fact they only produce about 100 at a time, which is more expensive than to produce 5000 and sit on the stock. This is clearly wrong, £6.50 being a 'work' price and the kind of levy which pushes choirs to the photocopier, which as we all know is one of the biggest problems within our



business. With the full cooperation of Boosey and Hawkes we have managed to get short order titles down from £6.50 to £3.50, which while I agree is still expensive is far better than previous.

We are currently in talks with Hal Leonard who distribute the Ricordi catalogue to do the same, £6.99 being a silly price for Speed Your Journey, as well as Funiculi Funicula, both titles which most choirs already have in the repertoire So far discussions have been ongoing for more than six months... Don't hold your breath.








Ian Dyer performed *Division On The Carmans' Whistle*, soprano Debbie Wright sang *Waltz Song* from 'Merrie England', alto Jo Welch sang Louis Armstrong's *It's A Wonderful World* and baritone Matthew Terrado Sang *It Was A Lover And His Lass* from 'As You Like It', music by Finzi. The choir was led by Musical Director Rosemary Phillips and accompanied by Andrew Biggs.

In March the choir held a 'Come and Sing' event at New Road Methodist Church, Stourbridge. It was wonderful to see so many people join the choir for an afternoon of singing. Following the rehearsal, tea and cakes were served before a short concert of music from 'The Armed Man' and 'Les Miserables'. The choir is looking forward to hosting another 'Come and Sing' event in the near future.

Introducing, the Rock 'n' Soul Singers from Underwood, Nottinghamshire.

The Rock 'n' Soul Singers started as a fun choir in August 2012 with the idea of providing opportunities to sing mainly rock and pop music together, in a mixed choir in the rural Nottinghamshire area of Under wood, Bagthorpe and Brinsley.



The choir began with just eight members who just wanted to meet together to experience the joy of singing. Today we number 50 with a good balance of sopranos, altos, tenors and basses.

We meet weekly at our local church in Underwood. Our dedicated musical director, Dave Gibbon, has a wealth of experience and talent as well as a career as head of a music department in a local school before he retired. Dave also sings in two local male voice choirs, Bestwood and Pye Hill. We are also privileged to have a very experienced and talented accompanist in Teresa Mills who also plays for other local choirs.

Our repertoire at present is made up of a range of rock, pop and soul music. We always provide a local Christmas concert. We have performed to a variety of local groups, The Elderberries and Sutton Seniors, as well as a very gruelling but fun session in our local shopping centre in Nottingham. We also take delight in being asked to support other local groups in their fundraising efforts such as our performance at Wollaton Village and more recently at an event in Jacksdale which was celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and also raising funds for Kings Mill hospital breast cancer unit. #### Mevagissey Male Choir Cornwall

Bobbing and surging lazily across the bay, a pod of dolphins greeted our audience as they settled into their seats at the Minack Theatre in May. For those prepared to descend another score or more steps to the stage area (there are around 80 in all) and peer over the low wall, there was the added bonus of a family of seals basking on the rocks.

However, it is over 100 steps down from the car park and entrance to the stage, so some preferred to take no more than necessary. And yet our risers had to be carried by hand all the way down — along with the new back safety bars. To second tenor Graham Alee's horror one escaped from its bag on the way down and disappeared over the edge — fortunately to nestle on a grassy outcrop just below the path.

Carved out of the cliffs high above the golden sands of Porthcurno and the Atlantic Ocean, West Cornwall's unique outdoor auditorium was the venue for Mevagissey Male Choir's joint concert with the Culdrose Military Wives Choir, the only Cornish contingent among the now 80+ strong Military Wives movement.

The Minack is one of the world's most spectacular open-air theatres. It was conceived in 1931 by Rowena Cade, who lived at the top of the cliff and wanted somewhere for local

drama enthusiasts to perform Shakespeare's 'The Tempest'. She built it herself, with her gardener, Billy Rawlings, over the winter of 1931 and into 1932, moving tons of earth and countless granite boulders to create the stage and the lower terraces. Over the years, this was expanded and developed into a breath-taking 750-seat auditorium.

Saturday 14 May saw Mevagissey Male Choir's third visit in five years and it was the second time we had been accompanied by a Military Wives Choir. In 2014 we welcomed the ladies from Plymouth, the first of the many inspired by Gareth Malone's TV series.

Just as when their sisters from Plymouth shared a concert with us there two years ago, the air was filled with 'ooh's' and 'aah's as the Culdrose ladies caught their first glimpse of the magnificent setting where they were about to perform. And they produced a performance to match, with magnificent renditions of Skyfall; True Colours; Lean on Me; Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy, and many more, including their own Military Wive's prayer, the moving Wherever You

Mevagissey performed a few of their more popular pieces, among them *Blue Moon; Hallelujah; Au Fond du Temple Saint*, from Bizet's 'Pearl Fishers', and *We Rise Again* and introduced another new piece, *Every Time I Feel the Spirit*. We were all entertained by Meva Cappella, our choir quartet, at one point, and Mevagissey and Culdrose joined forces for the conclusion, a powerful rendition of *Morte Christe*.

It was a special day for one member of the audience, Ed Barnicoat, a long-time admirer of the Choir who had been gifted a weekend in Porthcurno and tickets to the event by his family for his 70th birthday – duly acknowledged by compere Adrian Wilton – superb as ever – and by the choir in song, of course.

The verdict? 'We had such a wonderful night, it won't be forgotten', said Cul-



drose's Anna Oliver. 'The backdrop, the atmosphere, the dolphins. And your choir sang fantastically, we were very impressed indeed'. As we were with you, Anna.

On 10 September, Mevagissey will be renewing their acquaintance with the Plymouth Military Wives, who are just back from appearing at New York's Carnegie Hall. They have agreed to be our guests at Truro's Hall for Cornwall, where will be performing together for the fifth time. Tickets are available via <a href="https://www.hallforcornwall.co.uk">www.hallforcornwall.co.uk</a>. At the same time, we will be launching our long-awaited Christmas CD. A month later, we are off to Cyprus, to sing with the Akrotiri and Episkopi Military Wives Choirs.

In January of this year we had a glorious celebratory dinner at a local club and we were delighted to see former members of the choir and partners there and to see them all in good health.

We have had some very successful concerts since then; none more so than when we met up with Cirencester Male Voice Choir for a concert in Cirencester Parish Church and the more informal surroundings of the 'afterglow' following the concert, always an important ingredient of a successful evening out.

For our tour this year we will be travelling to Swansea, where we are delighted to be

taking part in concerts with two famous Welsh choirs - Morriston Orpheus and Dunvant MVC. Two concerts to definitely look forward to.

Looking further ahead, on 22 April 2017 we shall be hosting the NAC Conference massed choir concert in the historic surroundings of Gloucester Cathedral. The cathedral is now probably best known for the world's oldest choir festival - The Three Choirs Festival, which is held every three years in the cathedral, taking its turn with the cathedrals of Worcester and Hereford. On a lighter note, people will recognize parts of the building as the backdrop for films such as Harry Potter, Dr Who, Wolf Hall and many other productions. Every cathedral has its own share of gruesome history and Gloucester's is the story of Bishop Hooper who was burned at the stake for heresy. Unfortunately for Bishop Hooper, the fire was poorly laid with green sticks so his demise took longer than it should have done and the fire had to be re-lit three times.

It is said that the cathedral was saved by Henry VIII because it housed the canopied shrine of his ancestor Edward II, who was murdered in nearby Berkeley Castle The Great East Window is the size of a tennis court and considered to be the largest ever seen and incorporates the 'Gloucester Golfer'. The windows of the cathedral contain stained glass from the 14th century to the present day, some of which is considered the most important of its kind in England.

There is an interesting connection with America in the history of the building. In 1750, John Stafford Smith was born the son of the cathedral organist. He went on to compose the music that is now the American national anthem — the Star Spangled Banner.

On behalf of the Gloucestershire choirs in the South West area we hope you have an enjoyable conference and enjoy the thrill of singing in such a historically important building.

#### Choir Of The Year 2016 – The Choral Journey Continues

With 9 audition days hosted across the UK and over 150 choirs auditioning for the grand title, the Choir of the Year 2016 audition stage has come to a close. However, the choral journey continues as 16 choirs will be 'singing it out' at the Category Finals at Birmingham Symphony Hall in October, for a place in the Grand Final in December.

Celebrating choral music in all its forms, this inclusive competition has welcomed choirs from varying abilities and genres to its stages over the last six months, including acclaimed choirs of 100 singers, starting out choirs comprised of 8 jazz-scatters and 'we'll give it a go' choirs simply doing it for the love of it. From Bach's 'Mass in B minor' to Adele's 'Skyfall', we've witnessed an amazingly varied collective of choir-book classics and contemporary covers. All in all, it's been a mega-mix of choral magnificence.

As 'A Friend of Choir of the Year', we've travelled the length of the country over the last six months to join the 'choral parade'. Setting off in the city of Leeds on the 13 March, the Choir of the Year 'caravan' has stopped off in Warwick, Basingstoke, Truro, Cardiff, Cambridge, Gateshead, Portsmouth and Glasgow, finishing up in St Albans this June

and we've followed its journey every mile of the way.

It has been a privilege to be a part of this wonderful event, meeting with choirs from all over the UK and witnessing stunning auditions from some of the best choirs in the country. It has also been a great chance for us to talk to choirs about their plans to take the next step in their choral journey.

The ethos of this year's Choir of the Year has been all about progression and development, epitomised by Choir of the Year's partnership with ABCD, creating choral masterclass workshops for choirs looking to improve their sound. The competition is a way for choirs to pick up new performance and repertoire ideas, perform to a large audience and receive constructive criticism from their choral peers, all with a view to growing and progressing as a choir. This was emphasised by Choir of the Year Judge and Musical Director, Ken Burton, who drew on his own experiences of a slow and steady climb to the Choir of the Year title, after several entries to the competition with his own choir.

In light of this ethos, we recognise that a great way for choirs to build in confidence

and develop as a unit is to go on tour and with the opportunity to perform in iconic venues around the world whilst enjoying a great social time with your choir, an international concert tour could be the next step toward progression. Choirs often tell us how beneficial it is to have spent an intensive period of time together; not only from the viewpoint of group bonding but to have the opportunity to rehearse and perform together over the course of a concentrated week, as opposed to intermittent or weekly rehearsals.

Encouraging the ambitions of passionate musicians and providing them with special performance opportunities is at the heart of what we do which is why we are thrilled to be a part of the biggest choral event of the year for a second time. We are delighted that the Choir of the Year 2014 winners are touring with us to The Rhineland next year and we look forward to working with more choirs looking to take the next step in their choral journey!

## Worcester Male Voice Choir Midlands South West

This proved to be a remarkably busy and very successful quarter. No sooner had our previous visitors the Choir d'Annebault and the Vernon Conservatoire de Musique returned to France then we were hosting the Victoria (Australian) Welsh Choir who were on tour in the UK.

The original idea of a concert was initiated by Barbara Chapman, President of the Inner Wheel Club of Pershore who wanted to organise something which raised funds for Parkinsons UK. Barbara's late husband was a long serving member of our choir and had suffered from the illness. Musical Director Nicholas Wright took on the task of organising the musical programme and during that process was approached by the Australian choir to perform with us. It was very appropriate to invite them to guest at this concert as the late Derek Chapman had strong connections with Australia and New Zealand.

The venue for the concert was Pershore Abbey, a favourite with our choir, and which accommodated the large number of choristers, a full audience and provided refreshments within the building. The acoustics in this venue are excellent and the tourists' choice of music and different sound to the host choir complemented very nicely. Initially the Australians sang one of our favourites What Would I Do Without My Music but then followed with quite a serious set of pieces and in fact changed a number from their original programme after the interval, showing great versatility, and the audience loved it.

Our choir performed a number of recent additions to the Worcester repertoire including *Cavatina*, *Benedictus*, and *The Holy City*. The joint choirs sang *Gwahoddiad* and *Rachie* with the tourists proving they were Welsh and the home choir showing once more their linguistic skills.

Following the concert a traditional afterglow took place in a local hotel and cemented the excellent spirit engendered despite having only met a couple of hours before the concert began. The next day the Australians gave a free lunchtime concert in Worcester Cathedral. A fitting end to a tour which had included two major concerts in Cardiff. The opportunity to sing with other choirs is an important part of male voice choral singing and when this involves those from overseas it is an additional pleasure.

Just three weeks later and the choir hosted the English Association of Male Voice Choirs Annual Concert 2016 in Worcester Cathedral, quite a challenge in its own right but coming quickly after the previous concert might have been too much for some. The planning of the musical programme and organising all the logistics of a major concert demanded a great deal of time and effort but the individual contributions of key members of the choir - Nicholas Wright MD, Les Janes Stage Manager and myself (so I am told) in the capacity of Chairman of the EAMVC, meant that through a great team effort we had an outstanding concert.

Over 200 choristers from seven choirs based in the Midlands region, the Birmingham Horn Sound (19 horn players), our ever present guest organist Keith Hearnshaw and talented soloist Claire Bessent provided the ingredients. Over 600 people packed the Cathedral and the compère for the evening, Lord Digby Jones, entertained





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and moved the concert through in a seamless manner. The tradition of the EAMVC is for the host choir to sing several pieces by itself and we sang Oh, Virgin Of The Angel Host, For The Beauty Of The Earth and Irish Blessing. Also it is a tradition for the MD of the host choir for the following year to conduct several pieces and Steve Roach from Birmingham Icknield MVC assisted by Chris Walk fulfilled that with - amongst other pieces - Yesterday and Sailing. Much of the work was once again completed superbly by Nicholas Wright our MD and our two other musical team members, accompanist Sheila Leatherland and assistant accompanist, Scott Wolfendon. Nicholas had included Gwahoddiad - in English this time of course - and Cohen's Hallelujah as part of the contribution of the EAMVC massed

A wonderful evening which ended with the traditional *Morte Christe* once more sending everyone home elated. Not forgetting of course that all this effort also provides much needed funds for local and regional charities and on this occasion St Richards Hospice and Acorns Children's Hospice both received £3000.

Follow that (as they say) and we did. Strangely enough three events in the rural west of the county in the Martley area. First we were invited to sing in what would have been a very different venue - a beautiful walled garden which was provided for the Teme Valley Geological Group. Unfortunately the British weather let us down and we retreated to the local village hall for the actual concert; having said that outside performances can be very challenging without an effective external sound system.

Second we were invited to perform at the Malvern based international motor company Morgan Motors annual 'Thrill on the Hill' event held at the Shelsley Walsh Hill Climb. It was a wonderful setting in the heart of the Worcestershire countryside. A suitable setting for one of the UK's largest gatherings of Morgan motor cars. This was an open air event but we obviously impressed having already been engaged for a further event by the company. The final concert of this period was a return to the Martley Village Hall. This time we were raising funds for the Nora Parsons Day Centre - a centre for the elderly and lonely from twenty-one surrounding villages. It may not have been The Royal Albert Hall or Symphony Hall but it proved to be a simply wonderful evening enjoyed by a responsive audience and a relaxed choir. Drinks, sandwiches, raffle, a cricket match in the adjacent field and a glorious summer evening. A great concert with a good performance by the choristers and a wonderful guest soloist, David Coulson, whose renditions of Maderia M'Dear and Joyce the Librarian received rapturous applause as did the choristers Welsh singing of Gwahoddiad.

All work and no play is not good so we have squeezed in a couple of social events. The Ladies' Committee organising another splendid BBQ and our MD invitied us to a Picnic by the Pool where some choristers showed off their Olympic skills. The summer continues with new additions to the repertoire, dusting down of Christmas carols, chorister recruitment efforts and preparation for the Annual Concert in September when there will be a Scottish flavour. ## **Solent Male Voice Choir** Southern Counties

All roads this year are leading to the Royal Albert Hall and the London Welsh Festival of Male Choirs on Saturday 15 October. For Solent MVC based in Havant, near Portsmouth, it has been the heartbeat of our singing lives with the commitment and practice required to overcome the challenge of singing many songs written in the language of the valleys.

There have been extra practices and one of our enthusiastic basses, John Snowling, has emerged as chief 'physio' to the team's fitness by spending hours producing phonetic versions of the Welsh which

choristers have then hand written into their books. 'I've quite enjoyed doing it,' said John, 'because it makes all the difference to the choir's ability to learn these pieces quickly.'

He has held the extra practices in his studio at home, where he has room for ten singers per session. Geoff Porter started the year sharing the conducting with former DoM Howard Wilkie, but in early summer the latter departed for pastures new and Geoff – after some persuasion from Chairman Charles McAndrew – agreed to step up, at least until Christmas. And Geoff has emphasized to the choir that they must do their 'homework' every week if Solent is to impress in October.

It's not been all work and no play, however. The choir enjoyed a weekend tour to the Cotswolds in early June with concerts at Cheltenham and Tewksbury. At Cheltenham we were the guests of Churchdown MVC and their conductor Ralph Barnes.

Highlights were undoubtedly the joint choir's rendition of *An American Trilogy* – the great sound of some sixty voices in the modestly-sized St Andrew's Church. Montpellier – and the star quality of Ralph's tenor voice singing *Nella Fantasia*.

In Tewksbury our audience showed appreciation for a different format - numbers from our repertoire of show songs, spirituals and modern favourites, plus the sharing of a three-part narrative journey with cancer survivor Anne Careless. Macmillan Cancer Support were on the receiving end of a tidy cheque.


The evening marked the farewell concert for conductor, Howard Wilkie, after five successful years.



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## Newcastle-under-Lyme Male Voice Choir Midlands North

The weekend of 6/8 May heralded a long awaited special occasion for North Staffordshire when Newcastle-under-Lyme Male Voice Choir played hosts to The Intermezzo Polyphonic Choir based in Limoges in central France. The event had taken many months of planning by the Newcastle choir's Musical Director, Hannah Mead, aided by friends, family and choir members.

Following a visit to Lichfield Cathedral 'Intermezzo' arrived in Newcastle to an enthusiastic reception from NMVC and the evening commenced with an informal meal and social where choir members and partners overcame difficulties with the language barrier and were soon sharing experiences with their French guests. The evening ended with a short, light hearted and entertaining performance by both choirs.

'Intermezzo' is a mixed choir which performs (usually a cappella) a varied repertoire of songs ranging from French Renaissance to contemporary pieces, not to mention folk, negro spirituals and sacred music under the direction of Francoise Delicq, who has been its musical director for 25 years. Formed in 1983 the choir regularly performs around Limoges but the visit to Newcastle was its first venture abroad.

The highlight of the visit took place on Saturday evening when NMVC and Intermezzo were joined by two local ladies' choirs, The Daleian Ladies Choir under the direc-



tion of Janet Jowett and The Audley Ladies Choir directed by Margaret Nicol. The programme was opened by a joint and very moving rendition of *Amazing Grace* by all four choirs. This was followed by contributions from each of the choirs individually and included a total of twenty-four pieces from a wide range of genres. The evening was brought to a conclusion with all four choirs performing an arrangement of *Greensleeves*.

The concert was followed by a sumptuous buffet with more *entente cordiale* and an invitation to NMVC to visit France for a reciprocal event. The whole weekend was voted a huge success by both audience and choir members alike and well worth the hard work which was put into its organisation.

Here is the letter of thanks sent by 'Intermezzo' after the visit.

## The Glasgow Phoenix Choir Scotland West



Conductor and Director of Music – Marilyn J Smith, MBE, LRAM

Where has the summer gone? I say 'summer' but up here in the west of Scotland, we've not seen much sunshine! Our last season ended with good news and sad news. The good news was that, to the great delight of all concerned, our spring concert in Glasgow Royal Concert Hall raised almost £10,000 for Erskine. The sad news was that one of our long-term patrons, Professor Sir Malcolm MacNaughton, had died. Sir Malcolm, who was 91, was Emeritus Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at Glasgow University and had a long and distinguished career in medicine and academia. The choir sends condolences to his wife, Margaret-Ann, and their children and grand-children.

And so we start a new season and a busy time lies ahead. We're kicking off our year by recording a postcard CD of Scottish songs in aid of St Andrew's Hospice, Lanarkshire. The current hospice building has been in use since 1986 and, after 40 years, requires reconfiguration and refurbishment to meet the ongoing needs of the community. The aim of the current appeal is to raise £9,000,000. Glasgow Phoenix Choir will contribute to this by performing a concert in October at which the new CD, to be recorded in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, will be released. All proceeds of these two ventures will go towards the fund. At least it's a start.

We're off on our travels again, heading north to perform concerts in Strathpeffer,



Elgin and the Isle of Skye. The choir looks forward to this kind of tour as we have the great opportunity of singing in different venues, meeting up with old friends, making new ones and getting to know one another better over the odd glass or two of wine. What more could you ask?

In addition, we're celebrating a special anniversary with a special lady. Our conductor, Marilyn J Smith, has been with the choir for 25 years. Marilyn trained at the Royal Academy of Music and gained her Professional Certificate in Singing before moving to Scotland in 1973. She sang professionally as a soloist, and with Scottish Opera, the Royal Scottish National Orchestra Chorus, and the John Currie Singers. Choirs have always played a significant part in Marilyn's career. She first conducted a very successful junior choir in London, and in Scotland, trained and conducted children's and adult choirs before her appointment to the Glasgow Phoenix Choir. With the GPC she has made many recordings and toured Europe, the UK and USA. Marilyn teaches singing at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and the University of Glasgow and is in great demand as a vocal trainer. She gives regular vocal workshops and masterclasses and adjudicates at music festivals throughout the UK, and at the National Gaelic Mod in Scotland. Marilyn is proud that many of her students are now performing, teaching and conducting professionally themselves, keeping the tradition of choral singing alive. Marilyn was awarded an MBE in the 2012 UK Honours List in recognition of her services to music.

A wee soprano bird tells me that Marilyn's audition for the post of conductor was impressive in the levels of energy and drive she demonstrated. Everyone enjoyed the rehearsal and were delighted to welcome Marilyn to the choir. I'm told, however, that there were doubts about her ability to keep up the high energy levels displayed at the audition. Twenty-five years later and people are still wondering when she's going to flag. Congratulations, Marilyn, 'Lang may yer lum reek' or in English, if you prefer, long may your association with the choir continue.

#### **Voices in Harmony** Midlands South West

Formed for a one-off performance of Messiah, VIH will be celebrating 20 years of music making next year. A seventy strong



SATB choir, it has been led by Stephen Bradley from the outset, and performs a broad range of music, often summarised as The Beatles to Beethoven. Its aim is to introduce all people to the joys of singing as a choir both sacred and secular compositions. The members, male and female of all ages, meet to develop their knowledge, skills and techniques and sing for their own pleasure. VIH is fortunate to have several excellent soloists in each section to add colour and dimension to programmes in solo items as well as duets and quartets. At the same time, some members are not music readers, yet are willing and able to learn difficult pieces. We hold 6-8 concerts a year, the majority of which we do to raise funds for charities and local good causes. To date, the choir has raised approximately £80,000.

VIH has had another successful year so far, the highlight being guests of Sing For Four Community Choir in Cricklade, Wiltshire. As the coach approached the town, it was met by the Town Crier, to make us feel welcome and started the day on the right note (no pun intended). VIH's contribution to an excellent programme included Abba's Dancing Queen, The Chorus Of The Hebrew Slaves (sung in English albeit with a Black Country accent), Karl Jenkins' Healing Light from The Peacemakers, and Phantom Of The Opera. Helen Pysanczyn brought further variety in the form of delightful clarinet solos.

At Easter, Stainer's *Crucifixion* presented in Holy Trinity Church, Old Hill provided a well received focus for Holy Week.

For a number of years, the choir has joined with Cradley Heath Salvation Army and the

Festival Brass (brought together for the occasion) to hold a Remembrance Festival on the Saturday preceding Armistice Day, featuring in recent years an arrangement of For Those in Peril on the Sea by the choir's chairman and an arrangement for brass band and choir of Hymn to the Fallen by David Bishop-Rowe, MD of Festival Brass. The festival always attracts a capacity audience, with local MPs and other dignitaries, along with representatives of the Armed Forces and other services, to ensure that those who bought our freedom with their lives are not forgotten. The choir will commence rehearsals for this poignant occasion again very soon.

Another feature in the local area is the annual Christmas Concert, again attracting a capacity audience, supporting a couple of charities, always one being local to the choir's catchment area. The last couple of concerts have featured an ensemble from The Flowers Band of Gloucestershire, currently ranked number five in the world.

In recent times, the choir has twice performed Karl Jenkins' *The Armed Man* with orchestral ensemble to enthusiastic audiences, and reviews by those attending have compared the standard of music more than favourably with 'professional' performances in nearby Symphony Hall in Birmingham - an achievement which has spurred on the VIHers in their pursuit of ever higher standards.

Whilst always glad to sing in larger venues, the choir is keen to support the smaller places around the West Midlands, especially where charities benefit from ticket sales, and at Christmas will again be found at a local elderly residents home and a garden centre.

Voices in Harmony is justifiably proud of its junior choir, Pure Harmony, for youngsters aged 8 to 16, and the quality of sound and variety of repertoire belies the average age of the membership.

All in all, the choir goes from strength to strength, 2017 being already fully booked, and will include an Easter Meditation programme at Holy Trinity Church during Holy Week. Plans are also in hand for events in 2018. <a href="https://www.vihchoir.org">www.vihchoir.org</a>

Soloists were Colin Smith from Pye Hill whose soaring rich bass carried the old Mario Lanza classic, I'll Walk with God and



it was a special privilege and pleasure on this occasion to have supported such a valuable and respected local charity, The John Eastwood Hospice Trust. We all, as local residents, have much to be grateful for the existence and work of the Hospice in our community. This event was about two local male voice choirs coming together to make music. So it was great to do the joint choir pieces together. from Mansfield Ian Grice's sweet but piercing tenor can lift the music in many of our pieces I'm Goin' Up-a-Yonder for example. Well done guys. I have to mention the soloists and duetists, John Wakeland and Phil Robinson (both basses) from Mansfield hamming it up for all they were worth with their rendition of The Bold Gendarmes and especially John, working the audience for comic effect and 'accidently' allowing his fake moustache to fall off throughout the number. You can't fool me, John. We went from the ridiculous to the sublime with such a moving piece from Colin Dutton (first tenor) and Matt Dobney (bass) who carried such sweet expression in their spiritual medley, Swing Low Sweet Chariot.

choir. Through the website of the Suffolk Constabulary Male Voice Choir he tracked Colin down. It was then he learnt the choir was seeking a new Musical Director. ## **Kentwood**South West

Kentwood has a strapline which announces that it is 'The choir with a difference'. So what is the difference? Well, really it is a number of differences, which together define Kentwood and perhaps even make Kentwood unique. I would be glad to hear from any choristers who recognise them all



and with this in mind I have put them in order of importance to the singers, as this is my perspective.

We do not use music when we are performing and with very few exceptions we do not know in advance what we are going to perform. This adds a little spice to the adrenaline factor and means that you are not only very well-rehearsed but you get very good at knowing opening bars. Sometimes our Musical Director, Sheila Harrod, will introduce a group of songs for the audience and I remember when I was training that she introduced 'a set of beautiful songs by Rutter'. The question was which ones and did I know them? Thankfully I did but I'll never forget that anxious feeling.

Of course, there is some limit to the songs our MD will choose from. The repertoire changes every year but generally holds around 100 songs. I have been in Kentwood 13 years and have learned hundreds of songs (I stopped counting at 400), around a quarter of which have been written or arranged especially for us. We sing every kind of music, generally SATB but specially arranged pieces can be up to 8 parts. If I had to choose the genre that is most prevalent it would be Musical Theatre but this by no means defines the choir.



Kentwood has been going for 51 years, which in itself may not be unusual, but it has done so under the same Musical Director. Some of the founding members are even still part of the choir. There are around 35 of us at the moment and the average attendance is about 25 years!

Having said that, we are mixed ability choir (by that I mean that some are not able to sight read) and new people do join each year. I'll grant that it is a hard group to join, and that there are a lot of songs to learn before you can perform. From experience it takes about 3 years to fully take part and even then there are often song requests that we may not have sung for many years.

Everyone has lessons with the MD who teaches the Estelle Technique and we meet every Sunday and Monday - around 4 hours rehearsal each week. There is no coffee or chat, it is all business!

We have raised over £1million for charity with Rotary and Macmillan Nurses our greatest single beneficiaries. We have sung for large audiences of over a thousand to one person in hospital bed and from local supermarkets to The Royal Albert Hall with our wonderful President, Dame Cleo Lane and her late husband John Dankworth.

And finally, and I doubt this is a unique trait at least I hope not, every Kentwoodian loves to perform. There is a camarade-



rie that is hard to beat and a love of music that is palpable every time we sing.

If you live in the South West and would like to hear us there are plenty of opportunities. Come for a little Christmas magic on Sunday 27 November. We have 2 showtimes at 2.30 and 6.30. Tickets are £15 in aid of Parkinsons UK and a jolly good time.





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The first thing is to send your article attached to (not in the body of) an email to

publications.officer@nationalassociationofchoirs.org.uk

'Wow! that is a long email address', I hear you say. Yes it is but you will find that once it's in your computer you can just start to type it and your computer will offer to finish it for you.

Many of our contributors love to show their prowess by sending in wonderful finished articles with coloured headlines, five different fonts and many underlinings, italics and bold bits. Then, of course, I have to spend time taking them all out before I can set their article up the way you will see it in the magazine. KEEP IT SIMPLE!

#### **HOUSE STYLE**

We use Calibri 10pt in News & Views. (If you don't have this, don't worry I can soon change the one you use.)

Set your paragraphs to single space with no spacing before or after paragraphs.

Start with the name of your choir.

Then say the NAC group your choir is in.

Write your article.

Say who has written it.

Quotes use single speech marks (same key as @ but without the shift).

Dates do not include st nd rd or th

Abbreviations do not have full stops.

Song titles are shown in italics.

Do not put photos in the text.

Don't use am or pm in times.

Unless the word 'choir' is part of a title it should **NOT** have a capital letter.

Your choir is singular so 'the choir is' not 'the choir are'.

Send me pictures as high res .jpegs of between 1 and 5Mb or more, minimum 300 dpi.

Attach them to an email.

If this is hard to understand then ring me and I'll talk you through it.

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
