

Allegra Ladies Choir South Wales

In September 2018 Allegra celebrated its 7th birthday. In October the UK choir festival came to South Wales. The brainchild of Russell Scott the festival brings together different genres of choirs, regardless of age or standard, to take part in a range of singing workshops and activities.

When our concert secretary suggested we take part, no one really knew what to expect but, always willing to take on new challenges and seek out new singing experiences some 20 choir members decided to attend. So, battling against storm Callum, we made the short trip to Monmouth, a town in the Wye Valley.

Following registration, and an opportunity to meet other choirs attending, we were invited into the main hall. Adorned with the relevant colour wrist band were seated accordingly. Allegra were seated near the back but very visible due to our bright pink, relaxed, choir uniform T-shirts. Seated beside us was a children's junior school choir, the first to attend any of the festivals. This was indeed very good to see given recent press reports with regards to the demise of music opportunities in schools.

Following an introduction from Russell Scott and a brief history of the festival we did a vocal warm up and straight into the first workshop delivered by Ben Sawyer who was a judge on the talent show 'Sing: Ultimate A Capella' and is a member of A Capella group The Songmen. The session was truly inspiring with lots of new ideas around using our voices to make sounds as opposed to singing words, this included a very inventive use of the word gin, something us ladies know quite a bit about. Jen, our youngest member, represented the choir when Ben asked for a volunteer, her beat boxing was amazing. Look out for Allegra doing some a Capella with beat boxing sometime soon!

The second workshop was run by Russell Scott with a musical theatre theme. Russell asked us to consider how we convey emotions when we sing and invited on stage a group of participants to demonstrate. He asked them to consider a particular emotion, which he whispered to them, and to sing conveying that emotion. Following this we began to sing a very emotive song from Les Miserables, the iconic musical theatre stage show that has had a 31year run in London's West End. This time our MD Emma took to the stage to partner up with a gentlemen singer to perform the opening of the finale which brings the show to a rousing but somber end. Following this the other choir members were guided through the finale and we sang it through in fur parts. It sounded fabulous in the hall with hundreds of singers.

There followed a long lunch break which gave choirs the opportunity to rehearse for a short performance at the end of the day and the chance to socialise over a hot meal and a cup of tea. Choirs were also encouraged to busk around the venue whilst some groups booked extra master classes.

After lunch we were joined by Russell again who warmed up with a run through of *Somewhere* from West Side Story. What followed was undoubtedly the most popular session amongst the Allegra Ladies' with Stuart Overington. Stuart is an accomplished conductor and composer known for his engaging and informative style. The focus of this session was unity. Singers were encouraged to hold hands, close eyes and feel the music as we sang. We were stood on fold-away seating which was moving quite a bit, especially when we did the 'stomp' action. Sam, one of our 2nd sopranos, summed the session up well 'the Bulgarian chant caused vibrations that you could feel resonate through the floor and made 400 people feel like 1'. This session ended with all the singers dancing and clapping whilst singing a song of happiness. Our very own Becky took to the stage and contributed some fab riffs over the main choir singing.

This quite naturally led to the last workshop of the day on gospel singing with Ayo Oyerinde. Ayo was the creative/musical director of the London gospel choir for 10 years. His session centred around layering parts to build the sound, meaning we had to listen to each section's sound and pin point where our part was. We finished the day with a rendition of *Steal Away* which was very uplifting and gave our MD some ideas of fun ways for us to work on our own techniques.

What a superb way to spend a wet and windy Saturday. The next time the UK festival comes our way we will definitely be encouraging all choir members to attend so we can take part in the performance opportunity which ended the day.

Onwards to exciting plans for 2019. The first thing is a CD recording in early January and we are very proud to say that we have been selected to compete at the Llangollen International Musical Eisteddfod.

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Bestwood Male Voice Choir Midlands East

Colin Pursglove, Chairman of Bestwood MVC, was delighted to handover a cheque for £1,000 to the Mayor of Gedling, Councillor Barbara Miller, at a recent visit to the University of Nottingham's Cancer Biology Unit.

The cheque was towards the Mayor's Charity supporting prostate cancer research, being undertaken by Prof Anna Grabowska, in the university's Division of Cancer and Stem Cells, in collaboration with Mr Hari Ratan and Mr Will Green, Nottingham University Hospital's NHS Trust (NUH). The sum was the proceeds from Bestwood MVC's Annual Gala Concert at the Nottingham Albert Hall in September.

Bestwood MVC was very pleased to be supporting research into prostate cancer, which is the most frequently diagnosed cancer in men and the second commonest cause of cancer death. Over 11,000 men die every year of prostate cancer in the UK and the number increases every year, with only a small proportion of these initially diagnosed with prostate cancer going on to develop an advanced state of the disease. The research team, under Prof Anna Grabowska, will focus on developing a blood test potentially to be used as a non-invasive test to identify patients most likely to progress to clinically significant prostate cancer and therefore most urgently needing treatment. As there are side-effects associated with treatment, it is important to focus treatment on those most likely to benefit.

Erewash Phoenix Choir was founded in 2004 as a community singing group. Membership grew and the official ladies choir was founded in 2006. The choir has taken part in NAC concerts several times and performs with Long Eaton Silver Prize Band, Sandiacre Male Voice Choir and Pye Hill Male Voice Choir. We also perform for local community groups and have held concerts to raise money for Children In Need.

Just over 2 years ago, Chris Knapp took over as our Musical Director. He has moved the choir forward and has introduced us to a wider, more modern repertoire. Unfortunately, due to greater work commitments, Chris is unable to continue in his role after Spring 2019. Consequently, we will be looking to appoint a new Musical Director. Mendip Male Voice Choir South West **The Shining Project**

The membership of a choir has many benefits including the enjoyment of singing together, that terrific feeling after giving a great performance and the wonderful camaraderie of being part of a team. Another significant benefit is having the opportunity to raise a lot of money for charity. In common with many choirs, Mendip Male Voice Choir (MMVC) supports many local charities, the main one being Children's Hospice South West.

Nearly a decade has passed since Kate Courage, formerly the Musical Director of MMVC, introduced us to an incredibly beautiful and moving song called Shining for which she had written both words and music.

Dedicated to the Children's Hospice Southwest (CHSW), Shining is written from the child's perspective and, most imaginatively and remarkably, it is the child who offers guidance, love, encouragement and solace to the parent. The words are very poignant with many glowing images of light as the title suggests and the performance of the piece arouses strong emotions both in the choir and in the audience.



Initially written with children's choirs in mind, Kate produced a four-part, male voice version of Shining which has been in the repertoire of MMVC since its launch. In 2017, following an acclaimed performance in Wells Cathedral by massed Somerset male voice choirs, which raised thousands of pounds for CHSW, the idea blossomed that Shining merited a much wider audience, possibly becoming a kind of nationwide anthem for Children's Hospices.

Members of the choir have formed a Shining Project Team to make this idea a reality and over the next six months the team intends to contact every male voice choir in the UK with details of how to get involved. To allow you to judge for yourselves the quality of the piece and its appropriateness for your choir, a recording of Shining will be placed on our website www.mendipmen.co.uk/Shining along with recordings of each part produced by

Jamie Knights, our Musical Director. We have also been in contact with BaBa Productions, who distribute the sheet music and they have agreed to put a sample copy of the sheet mu-

sic on their web site, which can be download-

ed free for your perusal. Baba Productions

Should you purchase a set of copies for your library, there is the added incentive that a proportion of the royalties will go to your local children's hospice, thanks to the composer's generosity.

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Cor Meibion Colwyn Wales North

We have had a busy year with nearly 40 concerts and rounding off with 10 events in the 7 weeks up to 18 December. The choir has welcomed a number of choirs and a band in 2018. Colwyn's visitors performed entertaining and varied programmes in joint concerts in Llandudno. Colwyn's special visitors were the Gloucestershire Police Male Voice choir, the North Iowa University Male Glee Choir, the Werneth Concert Band from Stockport, the New Mill MVC from Huddersfield and the East Fife Male Voice Choir. Ten of Colwyn's 2018 concerts raised money for charities including St David's and St Kentigern hospices, Ty Gobaith (Hope House) Wales Air Ambulance and RNLI Over the years Colwyn has raised around £150,000 for charities.

Côr Meibion Colwyn (Colwyn Male Voice Choir) toured the Ypres area in Belgium to pay their respects o the fallen of the First World War in late October/early November. It was privileged to sing as part of the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate in Ypres where representatives of the choir also laid wreaths on behalf of the choir and the Bay of Colwyn Town Council.

Artillery Wood Cemetery was also visited to pay respects and hold a short service of remembrance, recitation, song and laying of a wreath at the grave of Hedd Wyn the bard from Trawsfynydd (Ellis Humphrey Evans) who was killed on the first day of the Battle of Passchendaele 31 July 1917. He was 30 years old. At the nearby Welsh Memorial at Habegos a wreath was laid. This was followed by a meal and a Noson Lawen at Marc's Restaurant De Sportsman, a short walk from the memorial.

The choir held two concerts during the five-day tour, including one in the impressive St Martin's Cathedral with its amazing acoustics.

At that concert the choir met up again with a Belgian family, local to Ypres, who had been to one of Colwyn's summer concerts at St Mary's Church Betws y Coed. Some of the live performances in Ypres, Betws y Coed and Llandudno are on the choir's Facebook pages (see below). The last Concert on the eve of departure for home was in the historic St George's Memorial Church in Ypres as part of their impressive Poppy Cascade from the church tower and its external walls. We attended the service of commemoration and blessing of the Poppy Cascade followed by a reception in the memorial hall and the evening concluded with the concert.

The tour was an important part of the choir's commitment this year to show its respect for the lives lost during the war. The reception by the Belgian people was superb and the choir is left with very fond memories, both emotional and enjoyable and considered it a privilege to be involved in the week building up to the centenary of the end of the Great War.

To complete the week and closer to home on the following Sunday the choir took part in a Commemorative Service of dedication of a plaque with a further 26 names



of locals who died as a result of military conflict in war. The service was held In St John's Old Colwyn and the plaque was placed on the Cenotaph in Old Colwyn in time for the Armistice Service on the following Sunday.

At the end of November, Colwyn took part in the annual Tree of Lights ceremony in Rhos on Sea where 800 people sang carols out of doors on the Promenade and raised funds for local hospices. A contrasting carol concert was in the new RNLI Lifeboat station on Llandudno Promenade. This proved to have an excellent acoustic and good sight lines and facilities. The sloping floor designed to drain sea water off the boat also means that for the audience seating is raised the further they go back! The lifeboat was towed out and seating provided for 200 audience in the main lifeboat hall.

Colwyn will sing in aid of the RNLI again in 2019 in Llandudno and Colwyn Bay. To date Colwyn has around 15 concerts scheduled for 2019. One of the choir's main events will be competing in the National Eisteddfod in Llanrwst in August 2019. One of Colwyn's main venues is St John's Church Mostyn Street Llandudno in their Tuesday and Thursday Welsh choirs season that runs from May to October each year. The church has an excellent acoustic, reputation and comprehensive website. The choir is also arranging joint concerts with visiting choirs. A short trip to Derbyshire will be to sing in aid of the Macmillan Nurses, Royal Derby Hospital and Air Ambulance on 22 June in Wirksworth Parish church. Other events will include singing at local weddings and organisations. The choir will welcome further concerts for 2019 and 2020 and will be pleased to discuss plans for joint concerts and welcome visiting choirs and visitors to the North Wales coast in 2019. The choir is pleased to welcome both visitors and potential new choristers to its rehearsals at Old Colwyn Community Centre on Wednesdays and Sundays.





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

BOOK REVIEW 12 Oak Avenue Christopher Wiltshire

On 17 March 1911 a choir of 250 singers sailed from Liverpool at the start of its six month world tour. Its core was the Sheffield Choir, conducted by Henry Coward, but it was augmented by members of many other choirs throughout the North of England. At the time the tour received a lot of public attention, and any book that deals with British musical culture in the early twentieth century will mention it. This book presents extracts from the letters of Henrietta May Midgley, one of the singers on the tour and a member of a well-known musical family in Sheffield at the time.

The letters are interesting because of the insight they provide into everyday experience in an amateur choir that was exceptional, even at a time when choral singing was probably at its most popular and large choirs were not unusual. Often the most commonplace aspects of life at other times are not accessible to us now because they never seem worth mentioning, and May provides many glimpses into how it was to travel in the British Empire at its height. Official accounts including Coward's own recollections of the tour are necessarily guarded in commenting about the personalities on the tour, but private correspondence could be more open.

The extracts from the letters are accompanied by commentaries and explanations that will help readers who are not familiar with the historical context of the tour and might never have heard of some of

the major players. At first I thought that the device of printing the text of the letters in a script font, to distinguish it from the commentary, would be a distraction, but it is actually very effective, allowing a smooth flow from one to the other.

The editorial task of selecting passages that might be of general interest a century after the events described can not have been easy, and then finding a structure into which they would fit naturally would present another problem. The easiest solution might have been to use a chronological sequence but instead the material is organised into themes based around personalities. Where these are more or less well-known, such as Elgar or Coward himself, the letters are at their most revealing. I was less concerned with May herself and the various members of her family that she met during the tour, but such details do provide another context that might help a general reader to relate to the letters, and will certainly interest any living relatives.

This short book can be read in a few hours, and anybody with a background in choral singing will have little difficulty in relating to the personalities and events described. If you are interested in musical life before the First World War you will like it.

We were invited to perform a fundraiser for Wentworth House Restoration Trust in 2017 and have performed twice in the Marble Hall since in this wonderful historical building, raising in excess of £7000 with further concerts planned.

We have continued to support Wentworth Church Music Festival week, being the only performers to have attended this none competitive celebration of music, every year in its 20 years of existence.

Phew! That was quite a first half to our season. We've sung, celebrated, wept tears of joy and tears of sadness. And it looks like we're in for more of the same in the New Year.

Our first big concert events of the season saw the choir head off for a long weekend to the Highlands. The first concert of the series took place in the lovely town of Strathpeffer, where we were staying in the Ben Wyvis Hotel with its ever-patient staffthey put up with a lot when we vis-singing, having to have meals at odd times, more singing, talking, drinking, further singing sometimes not quite as tuneful following the consumption of alcoholic beverages, though occasionally better! All three concerts were very well attended and raised a goodly sum for each cause supported. In addition, our social committee inflicted a guiz on the travelling singers and raised £125.00, which was added to the total for Marie Curie.

In October, we had yet another long-service award ceremony, when Anne MacDonald, Janette Walker, Ken O'Donnell and Stewart Moir were each presented with a glass 'wave' to commemorate their 25 years each of service to the choir. Quite an achievement and one that the choir enjoyed helping them to celebrate.

November saw us return to St Michael's Parish Church in the amazing town of Linlithgow - birthplace of Mary Queen of Scots - the church itself is very beautiful and has an amazing acoustic. As we've previously sung Christmas concerts in St Michael's there'd been a bit of concern for the Rotary Club organisers that we might not attract a big audience. In fact, the attendance was much better than it has been before, a surprise since there were so many other events on in the town that evening. Later in the month, a small group from the choir took part in the BBC's Big Sing, televised on 23 December - they had a great time, and we're hopeful that on a future occasion the timing might work better for us so that more people can take part.

That brings us to December and Christmas. We had the great pleasure of taking part in two carol singing events in Glasgow; the first in the Blythswood Hotel, which is a very swanky venue and the following day in the Savoy Centre, a small shopping mall in the city centre, which has recently been refurbished. We were led in these events by Cameron Murdoch, who manages to play piano and conduct simultaneously - and they say men can't multi-task! My funniest moment of the two events was seeing the expression on Cameron's face when an elderly lady approached him as he played and conducted to try to give him some money – he's good, but he does only have two hands, both of which were very busy at that moment. It was an uplifting affair and was hosted, much to her own surprise, by Marilyn. She did a great job, especially as she'd had to step in at very much the last minute.

We ended our Christmas season with our usual round of three concerts in East Kilbride, Edinburgh and in Glasgow Royal Concert Hall. All three were most enjoyable to take part in and greatly appreciated by our audiences. The final concert of the series allowed us to honour, formally, Bill Forrest's 60 years with the choir – Bill says he's just keeping up with Sir Cliff!

And so, we're in holiday mode for the moment and looking, as you do at this time of year, to the future. Changes lie ahead for us – firstly, we move to a new rehearsal venue from the middle of January: St. John's Renfield Church becomes our new home, having served us in a variety of ways over the years and we're looking forward to settling in there.

Our second change is much more significant. After 28 years, our much-loved conductor, Marilyn J Smith, will be leaving the choir at the end of this season. The news was met with shock and sadness, but with the realisation that things cannot always stay the same. Orpheus Male Voice Choir Grimsby & Cleethorpes Lincolnshire

NEARLY 70 YEARS OLD!

The Orpheus Male Voice Choir has been part of the cultural and social life of the Grimsby and Cleethorpes area since soon after the end of World War II. It was founded in 1949 in response to the wishes of local men, many recently returned from service in the armed forces, to sing together as a male choir. Remarkably, six of the founder members were still actively singing with the Orpheus when its 50th anniversary was celebrated in 1999. Many of us recall the names of Frank Jobson, Bert Bantock, Vic Dumelow, Stan Wray and Alan Burton, who all had 50 years continuous service. Harry Graham, who was widely known in local music circles and was also a founder member, had returned to the choir after a short break.

Most of the choir's major concerts on home ground have been given at the Grimsby Central Hall in Duncombe Street, with its splendid acoustic for musical events. This feature has been commented on by nationally known professional performers. Grimsby Town Hall has also hosted a number of the choir's concerts. Others have been held at many local churches, often to raise funds for the churches themselves and various charitable causes.

Many concerts have featured well-known local guest performers and also prominent visiting artists of the highest calibre: soloists both vocal and instrumental, small groups, choirs, brass bands and jazz bands. These are too numerous to name them all,



but over the decades they include: Phyllis Sellick, Keith Swallow, Angela Brownridge and Richard Markham (pianists); Marion Studholm, John Lawrenson, Linda Strachan, Charles Daniels, Maryetta Midgely, Michael Dore and Frances Brookes (singers); RAF Cranwell Band, Black Dyke Mills Band, Brighouse and Rastrick Band and the British Steel Band; Leo Solomon Trio, Humphrey Lyttelton and his Band, and the Best of British Jazz, the last with such illustrious names as Kenny Baker, Don Lusher, Jack Parnell, Roy Wilcox, Lennie Bush and Brian Lemmon.

The Orpheus has also presented visiting choirs from all over the country as guest performers. These have included some of the most outstanding male voice choirs as well as mixed choirs. Such links have led to the Orpheus travelling to concerts in other areas: more locally, to Hull, Beverley, Scunthorpe, Caistor, Market Rasen and Louth. Examples of visits further afield have been to Thurnscoe (West Yorkshire), Nottingham, Newcastle, South Shields, Wimborne (Dorset), Dore (Sheffield), Berriew and Garndiffaith (both Wales). Involvement in the choral movement generally has been greatly helped by membership of the National Association of Choirs, of which the Orpheus Musical Director, Richard Bradley, was chairman for several years and is a vice-president. The Association's Lincolnshire Group arranges joint concerts and workshops for the member choirs in its area.

International exchanges have taken place with choirs in Europe, with many personal friendships developing as a result. It all began with a visit to Eindhoven, Nijmegen and Boxmeer in Holland in 1967, following an initial trip to the Orpheus by the Eindhoven choir the previous year. Contacts were later made with Meinerzhagen and Rauschendorf in Germany. Rauschendorf is a village near the beautiful town of Konigswinter (on the Rhine, near Bonn), with which Cleethorpes is twinned. Further links were made with Alingsås (Sweden), the Dutch National Male Voice Choir and Pessac in France. Concerts were also given with guest choirs from Norway and South Africa.

The Orpheus Male Voice Choir has had many successes at competitive musical festivals over the years, both locally and in other parts of the country. Perhaps the most prestigious first prize was won

at the Biddulph Festival in 1990, beating several top rank choirs.

In June 1960 the choir took part in the BBC 'All Together' programme, from the Pier Pavilion in Cleethorpes. The Orpheus also featured in a Christmas broadcast from Hull City Hall in 1984. Along with other choral groups the Orpheus were invited to sing at a special concert, broadcast on Radio 3, to mark the opening of the new Grimsby Auditorium in June 1995. The work performed was Carl Orff's 'Carmina Burana' which was accompanied by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and conducted by Owain Arwel Hughes. The choir also sang in BBC Television's 'Songs of Praise' in 2001, when they performed from the bandstand outside the Grimsby Fishing Heritage Centre.

Various events are being planned to mark the choir's 70th anniversary year in 2019. Already scheduled is a celebrity concert on Saturday 30 March at Grimsby Central Hall, with piano duo David Nettle and Richard Markham. Both are renowned soloists in their own right. Richard, who grew up in Grimsby, gave his first public performance with the Orpheus in the late 1960s, and he went on to become a pianist of world class. He has never forgotten his roots and frequently returns to Grimsby to support local musical activity. Richard has played with the Orpheus on a number of occasions.

Over the weekend of 17-19 May 2019 the choir will be travelling to Wales to sing as guests of the Tonna Male Voice Choir, who were in Grimsby for a concert at the Minster in September 2017. Members enjoy the social side of these visits, and their wives, who are part of the choir 'family', are always welcome to go along too.

New members are welcomed by the Orpheus at any time. Although previous singing experience and the ability to read music are obvious advantages, they are not requirements for joining. We have a very varied repertoire, including uplifting hymn tunes, spirituals and other sacred music, arrangements of operatic choruses, traditional songs, items from musical shows and even pop songs. A Choristers' Guide To Keeping Conductors In Line

The basic training of every singer should, of course, include myriad types of practical and theoretical emphases. One important area which is often neglected, however, is the art of one-upmanship. The following rules are intended as guides to the development of habits which will promote the proper type of relationship between singer and conductor.

1. Never be satisfied with the starting pitch. If the conductor uses a pitch-pipe, make known your preference for pitches from the piano and vice-versa.

2. Complain about the temperature of the rehearsal room, the lighting, crowded space, and of a draft. It's best to do this when the conductor is under pressure.

3. Bury your head in the music just before cues.

4. Ask for a re-audition or seating change. Ask often. Give the impression you're about to quit. Let the conductor know you're there as a personal favour.

5. Loudly clear your throat during pauses (tenors are trained to do this from birth). Quiet instrumental interludes are a good chance to blow your nose.

6. Long after a passage has gone by, ask the conductor if your C# was in tune. This is especially effective if you had no C# or were not singing at the time.

7. At dramatic moments in the music (which the conductor is emoting), be busy marking your music so that the climaxes will sound empty and disappointing.

8. Wait until well into a rehearsal before letting the conductor know that you don't have the music.

9. Look at your watch frequently. Shake it in disbelief occasionally.

10. When possible, sing your part either an octave above or below what is written. This is excellent ear-training for the conductor. If he hears the pitch, deny it vehemently and claim that it must have been the combination tone.

11. Tell the conductor, 'I can't find the beat.' Conductors are always sensitive about their 'stick technique' so challenge it frequently.

12. If you are singing in a language with which the conductor is the least bit unfamiliar, ask her as many questions as possible about the meaning of individual words. If this fails, ask her about the pronunciation of the most difficult words. Occasionally, say the word twice and ask her preference, making to say it exactly the same both times. If she remarks on their similarity, give her a look of utter disdain and mumble under your breath about the 'subtleties of inflection'.

13. Ask the conductor if he has listened to the von Karajan recording of the piece. Imply that he could learn a thing or two from it. Also good: ask, 'Is this the first time you've conducted this piece?'

14. If your articulation differs from that of others singing the same phrase, stick to your guns. Do not ask the conductor which is correct until backstage just before the concert.

15. Find an excuse to leave the rehearsal about 15 minutes early so that others will become restless and start to fidget.

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Summer Of 2018

The summer of 2018 is likely to live long in the memory of all those associated with Newquay Male Voice Choir. It must rank as the busiest and most extraordinary summer since the choir's reformation back in 1974.

It all began on a warm sunny evening in July in the ballroom of the Atlantic Hotel when the choir, together with their guests, Eight in a Bar, presented a gala concert in aid of the local Cormorants Swimming Club. The audience was entertained by two choirs at the top of their game who sang a programme which covered the full range of the male choral repertoire while helping Newquay MVC to fulfil its stated intent to help to support local initiatives which engage with young people in the town.

Just three weeks later the choir found themselves, again in bright sunshine, singing in the open air and entertaining a large wedding garden party at Tresillian House, just outside the town. It had been a while since the choir had enjoyed an event such as this and they took the opportunity to sing a lighter programme of music which was clearly very much appreciated by the invited guests.

What was expected to be the highlight of the summer followed just a few days later when the choir performed on the main stage of the huge Boardmasters Festival, the only male voice choir in Cornwall to have done so. What an experience it proved to be working with a professional production team and a stage manager who has worked on some of the largest stages in the world. Everything seemed to be so much larger than life, from the huge speakers that were to project the choir's sound across the festival site to the massive expanse of the sound stage itself which seemed to swallow up the choir as we positioned ourselves. Of course it rained but this did not dampen the spirits of the choir nor the sizeable group of hardy people who donned wet weather gear and came to hear us. All but one of the choir's full singing membership were able to be there, some being very enthusiastically encouraged by family members to do so. We now appreciate the nature and influence of something we called 'grandchildren power'. And the choir nailed it! MD Richard Braebrook put together a high octane programme of bright and energetic pieces which cut through the misery of the weather to have people dancing and clapping along with every song. The choir even featured for a brief moment on the Chris Evans Radio 2 Breakfast Programme in the following week.

Following an experience such as this was likely to be difficult but Newguay MVC was able to do so with two outdoor performances. The first was only the following day at Padstow where we sang on the bandstand at the harbour side and the second came just a few days later when we were invited to sing as part of a new initiative, the Newquay Sessions, on the Killacourt in the town. Both occasions proved to be really enjoyable, offering the opportunity to entertain local people as well as those on holiday. The Killacourt concert took some of the singers back in time to a gentler age as we sang to an audience arranged in deck chairs in front of the bandstand; but on a warm sunny afternoon it all seemed to be very appropriate.

With September still not in sight the choir was then invited by Thames TV to audition for 'Britain's Got Talent'. At this stage the choir would probably have tried anything and so on the last Wednesday evening of the month we found ourselves in St Michael's Church singing in front of a television camera. We know that many other choirs will have been auditioned so we are retaining a sense of proportion about any prospects of actually appearing on the show but ' you have to be in it to win it' and, at the time of writing this piece, we have at least received what we have judged to be an encouraging response so watch this space. We may yet see 'grandchildren power' in operation again.

One might have expected that to be the final act of a very busy summer. However, for Newquay MVC over recent years that experience has always been reserved for the town's Fish Festival down at the harbour. This year was no exception as once again we took to the stage in the large bar and events marquee with a programme that entertained those singing as much as those listening. A good time was definitely had by all.

And there we have it, the summer of 2018, a summer full of excitement, enjoyment and experiences. Now, where have I put my Christmas music?

Newquay Male Voice Choir can next be heard at a concert commencing at 2.00pm in St Michael's Church on Sunday 14 October. Admission to this concert will be free. Further details are to follow.

Tour of Cwmbrân Male Choir to Derbyshire

On Saturday 29 September, Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir together with special guests, Cwmbrân Male Choir from South Wales and the highly talented tenor soloist, Jason Darnell, held a concert at St Andrews Church, Swanwick, which was greatly enjoyed by all present in a church filled to capacity. This raised the staggering sum of £1,607 for the Poppy Appeal.

The concert had taken a year in planning and involved the Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir hosting the Cwmbrân Male Choir in a long awaited return tour to Derbyshire', this time augmented by members of the Garndiffaith Gleemen, making it even more special.

The fun started on the Friday evening when members of both choirs met each other in the restaurant adjoining their accommodation at Ripley and inevitably began singing. This was to continue throughout the weekend at every available opportunity.

Cwmbrân Male Choir have travelled extensively throughout the UK, Europe and as far afield as the USA, but also have a long-standing friendship with the Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir going back to 1986. This concert was the fourth exchange visit between these well-known and successful choirs.

'It must be the Welsh accent that makes Welsh Male Choirs sound so distinctive and wonderful', commented one member of the audience, and then went on to say 'she did not realise also how talented the Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir are'.



The 'icing on the cake' for the concert was the four songs performed by Jason Darnell who was universally greeted with rapturous applause after each of his varied performances. Jason is now an international professional tenor and amongst other engagements has sang before the Pope this year and will also be singing at York Minster before Christmas.

Both choirs joined forces to open the concert singing *Stout Hearted Men*. This is the signature tune of both choirs and was performed with great gusto and pleasure.

Cwmbrân Male Choir then took centre stage singing Let All Men Sing, which is greatly enjoyed when performed as well as this accomplished Welsh choir. Calon Lân was a song everyone wanted to hear and the masterful rendition was such you did not want it end. My Lord What a Mornin' was sung with great sensitivity and their rendition of Jesus Paid It All reminded everyone present why every seat had been taken.

This was followed by Jason Darnell singing *Sweet Chance* by Michael Head, which



held the audience's attention in such a way that they were eager for what was to follow.

The Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir opened their account with a rousing but precise rendition of *The Song of the Jolly Roger* followed by the melodious and contrasting *Calm is the Sea*.

Jason Darnell's rendition of *Every Valley* from the Messiah by Handel can only be described as a virtuoso performance of this long and challenging piece.

The Pye Hill & Male Voice Choir completed the first half of the concert with one of their most requested and popular songs *Unchained Melody* and then for the first time *Ghost Riders in the Sky* and was surprised by the immediate reaction and involvement from the audience.

Following the interval, the Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir provided a powerful but sensitive rendition of *Morte Criste* followed by *Softly As I Leave You*.

Jason Darnell's rendition of *Danny Boy* by Weatherly was proof that the best voices are those which are clear, beautiful and capable of great variation without the need to be focused on volume for effect.

The Pye Hill & District Male Voice Choir completed their set with the evocative *American Trilogy* and *When the Saints Go Marching In* which was universally enjoyed.

Jason Darnell's final song *The Holy City* by Adams can only be described as a breathtaking masterpiece which captivated the audience.

The Cwmbrân Male Choir completed their set with an absolutely brilliant choice of songs, reminding the audience of the quality this Welsh choir led by their MD, Matthew Harrison who had recently been confirmed as the best young MD in South Wales. What Would I Do Without My Music was sung with the same freshness of voices as when the concert began. The Welsh classics O Gymru and Gwahoddiad were greeted like old friends and not wanting their presence to end, such was the quality of performance. The arrangement of Shenandoah by contrast was the best that I have ever heard and brought the song alive in a way that makes you cling to every word.

No concert of this nature could be a success without quality accompanists who play such a vital role for all the musical

performers. This concert had three of the best in the vastly experienced Rosemary Jones for the Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir, the very talented Lucie Bebbington-Lewis for Cwmbrân Male Choir and the outstanding Stephen Wall for Jason Darnell.

'I can't remember a concert which seemed to pass so very fast' said several members of the audience and the choice of *Bring Him Home* jointly performed by both choirs led by the very accomplished Linda Darnell, MD of the Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir could not have been more appreciated and a fitting finale to a wonderful evening.

Both choirs exchanged gifts to mark this prestigious occasion. The Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir was presented with an inscribed brass miner's lamp and the Cwmbrân Male Choir were presented with a vase decorated with poppies. Both choirs are to receive certificates of achievement from the Royal British Legion who were present with their standard together with several civic dignitaries, including the mayor and consort of Amber Valley.



As you will imagine the end of the concert was only an interruption to the continuation of the singing. Both choirs, family and friends followed on to the Dale Club at Jacksdale, the home of the Pye Hill and District Male Voice Choir, where a buffet was provided and following a well earned drink, or two, the singing continued to midnight including impromptu solos and renditions to add to the fun with Cwmbrân Male Choir finishing the evening by singing *There Will Be a Welcome in the Hillside*, which could not have been a more fitting end to a wonderful and enjoyable occasion. The following day both choirs visited Chatsworth House and Gardens before saying a fond farewell to each other and joined voices for the last time at 'Floras Temple' to sing before a delighted Duke of Devonshire. *Tan y tro nesaf!*

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
